Call to Worship: Psalm 47 verses 5 to 9

God has ascended amid shouts of joy, the LORD amid the sounding of trumpets. Sing praises to God, sing praises; sing praises to our King, sing praises. We join our praises to the ascended Christ as we sing a widely-travelled hymn. It was written as a poem by Pastor Karl Boberg in Sweden in the summer of 1885, set to a folk melody, translated into German, then into Russian. A Salvation Army missionary, Stuart Keene Hine, discovered it in Ukraine, translated and adapted it before being forced to return to the UK. He sent a copy to refugees in New Zealand and they forwarded it to Billy Graham. The rest is history! Hymn number 82, 'How great thou art!'

We know that we do not always love and serve you wholeheartedly and we bring to mind occasions when we have failed to love our neighbours as we love ourselves, by acting and speaking in a way that shames us and grieves you.

Gracious God, help us turn away from sin and back to the path you call us to tread. Merciful Lord, bring us into the light of your love as we seek your forgiveness for the sins we have committed and the good we have neglected to do.

Gracious heavenly Father, we believe you hear and answer our prayers, and that in your loving-kindness you have not only pardoned us but call us to follow you. May the power of the Holy Spirit guide and perfect our service, so our lives provide evidence of our faith and are a beacon to draw others to know and love our risen Saviour. Amen.

"Behold, I am coming soon! My reward is with me, and I will give to everyone according to what he has done. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the First and the Last, the Beginning and the End. Blessed are those who wash their robes, that they may have the right to the tree of life and may go through the gates into the city. Address 1

Revelation is a challenging book which was almost omitted from the canon, the accepted books of the Holy Bible. It is apocalyptic writing, at a time of crisis and was written to encourage readers to see the big picture of human history, beyond the crisis, focussing on end-times when God will reign supreme in peace and justice. The Good News is that evil has been defeated through Calvary and the resurrection. It is often avoided because it is difficult and has startling images and secret symbols which are less familiar to Twenty-First Century readers than Christians living in the last decade of the First Century A.D..

It is a difficult book to understand, but it was meant to be, as John was exiled on Patmos, an island off Turkey. He was known to the Roman authorities, so his message had to be coded. Therefore, Rome was referred to as Babylon, the Roman Empire was the great beast, Jerusalem was Sodom, the Church was represented as the bride, the Lamb and child was Jesus, the woman was Israel, while 7 represented perfection and 6 evil. Thus Emperor Domitian, who was persecuting and killing Christians was 666, evil, evil, or if you prefer, the Devil.

Our reading refers to Jesus, who declares the second coming is imminent, the faithful will be rewarded for their works and all are encouraged to remain faithful and pure until he comes again, for they will enter the New Jerusalem where suffering, sorrow and death are banished and new life inherited.

The last paragraph has the Holy Spirit and the Church calling for Christ to return, but the door is still open to unbelievers to hear the gospel message, 'the water of life', and find salvation. It is an encouragement for us to lead Christ-centred lives and to share Good News with all-comers whenever and wherever we can. Amen.

Our next hymn was written by Martin Lekebusch an I.T. specialist, who was born into a Methodist family in 1962. He is distinctly ecumenical and has been a member of Methodist, Anglican, Pentecostal congregations and is an elder at a Baptist church in Gloucester. The hymn was written when Martin was attending a Methodist church in inner-city Birmingham. He describes the congregation at that time as "a very mixed bag with a strongly evangelical character to it, with a charismatic aspect - but also an aspect of social engagement." I have asked that we sing the hymn to "Scarlet Ribbons", which I'm certain you will know, so you can concentrate upon the words. Hymn number 703, 'In an age of twisted values,' 1. In an age of twisted values we have lost the truth we need; in sophisticated language we have justified our greed; by our struggle for possessions we have robbed the poor and weak hear our cry and heal our nation:

your forgiveness, Lord, we seek.

2. We have built discrimination

on our prejudice and fear;

hatred swiftly turns to cruelty if we hold resentments dear. For communities divided by the walls of class and race hear our cry and heal our nation: show us, Lord, your love and grace.

- 3. When our families are broken; when our homes are full of strife; when our children are bewildered, when they lose their way in life; when we fail to give the aged all the care we know we should hear our cry and heal our nations with your tender fatherhood.
- 4. We who hear your word so often choose so rarely to obey; turn us from our wilful blindness, give us truth to light our way. In the power of your Spirit come to cleanse us, make us new: hear our cry and heal our nations till our nations honours you.

We come now to our prayers of intercession for people nearby and far-away. Let us pray.

Loving God, Jesus' passion, death and resurrection remind us that you care for us with boundless, unconditional and redemptive love. Grant us faith, wisdom, compassion and steadfastness to serve you as you desire. Do not let us not close our eyes and hearts to injustice, prejudice or neglect, but instead bid us strive courageously for the wellbeing of everyone and to share your love with our neighbours, nearby and far away.

In a year that we are commemorating the eightieth anniversary of VE Day, help us to recall the terrible cost of war, so we strive for peace and justice. We grieve that wars are currently being waged in Ukraine, the Holy Land, Myanmar, Congo, Somalia and Sudan with all the suffering, destruction, death and displacement that results from mankind's inability to co-exist with neighbours. We pray especially for civilians, particularly children, in Gaza and Ukraine as they face heavy bombardment and deprivation, that peace will end their suffering. Teach the leaders of all nations to negotiate and compromise, rather than using military force when disputes arise. We pray for just and lasting settlements to the conflicts we have named and for your shalom to be bestowed on all nations.

Jesus is the source of healing and well-being, so we pray for people who are ill, for those brought low by loneliness, fear or need and for all who are experiencing the pain of bereavement. In a time of silence, we bring to mind friends and neighbours for whom we are especially concerned....... Loving Lord, help us offer them practical support, but embrace them with your love, so they may be healed, encouraged and granted reassurance.

Saviour God, hear our prayer for this church, churches in our Circuit and indeed the World Church. May the light of Jesus' love guide us through the darkness of this

increasingly secular, materialist world. Unite us in love and purpose and help us proclaim good news boldly to a world that needs good news so much.

Abba, Heavenly Father, bless us, our families and friends. Keep us safe in your care. May the Holy Spirit guide and strengthen us in our discipleship, by following the example of Jesus Christ, by sharing the love you give us with all-comers and trusting in your grace and goodness evermore. Amen.

Our Gospel reading is John chapter 17 verses 20 to 26

"My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me.

I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one: I in them and you in me. May they be brought to complete unity to let the world know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me.

Father, I want those you have given me to be with me where I am, and to see my glory, the glory you have given me because you loved me before the creation of the world. Righteous Father, though the world does not know you, I know you, and they know that you have sent me. I have made you known to them, and will continue to make you known in order that the love you have for me may be in them and that I myself may be in them." Amen.

Address 2

Our Gospel reading is set at the Last Supper, when Jesus prayed for not only his disciples, but for everybody who would accept the Good News in the future. He was aware of tensions that already existed within the twelve: James and John had vied for prime places in heaven – to the fury of the remainder; whilst the disciples accepted Peter as their leader, he was erratic and too impetuous at times, so Jesus knew that Peter would struggle to keep the disciples united, once he had ascended to his Father. Jesus did not pray that their personalities would be erased, so they might effectively become clones of one another: what he asked was that they would be united in love, just as Christ is united with his Father. Despite their differences, the disciples were commanded to love one another in close fellowship, so the love they received from Jesus would empower them and their unity would convince non-believers of the value and truth of the gospels. Moreover, Jesus' prayer is universal: he prayed that this unity should be our gift, too.

Such unity depends upon the mutual love of God and Jesus for one another; upon the love of God living within the believers and for believers to let that love shine through their lives, so non-believers may come to know and follow the Lord. Contrary to some people's views, it does not point to any denomination having all virtues above others. Whilst I am a committed Methodist – and there are many who say I ought to be committed – I recognise that we don't have all the answers in worship, or service, but having said that, Methodism has a proud tradition of outreach. A fortnight ago, we celebrated Christian Aid, a charity formed at the end of the Second World War by different denominations of churches in Britain and Ireland. The tremendous work done shows how Christians from different traditions make a difference and transform lives. There is great value in the Churches Together Movement, where worshippers from different traditions meet to share ideas and serve their communities, but more can be done: imagine sharing resources, or working collaboratively on projects. We must not allow ourselves to be diverted from our task to love and serve the Lord by detail differences. Let us concentrate upon sharing the Good News Jesus lived and died for.

Just as the first disciples must have thought Jesus prayer fanciful, because human endeavour on its own is doomed to fail, we may think it is impossible for the Church to unite in service to the world. However, the disciples did not anticipate the gift of the Holy Spirit, who came down at Pentecost to convert a group of one hundred and twenty losers into a world-changing, unstoppable dynamic Church that resisted the persecution of the super-power of its age – the Roman Empire – and which has resisted persecution ever since. This same Spirit will give us enough grace to work collaboratively, so we can make a difference to our community – play our part in building the New Jerusalem. Come, Lord Jesus. Amen.

I considered finishing with 'Where shall my wondering soul begin?', named as the Wesley's conversion hymn, but some commentators claim that this was not the case; rather, it was 'And can it be', aka 'The bicycle hymn' to Tipton Methodist Church! We shall sing hymn number 345, 'And can it be'.
