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Reading: Ephesians 2: 1-22 (NIV)

As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient. All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our flesh and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature deserving of wrath. But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions – it is by grace you have been saved. And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus, in order that in the coming ages he might show the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus. For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith – and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God – not by works, so that no one can boast. For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

Therefore, remember that formerly you who are Gentiles by birth and called 'uncircumcised' by those who call themselves 'the circumcision' (which is done in the body by human hands) – remember that at that time you were separate from Christ, excluded from citizenship in Israel and foreigners to the covenants of the promise, without hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ.

For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility, by setting aside in his flesh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace, and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility. He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near. For through him we both have access to the Father by one Spirit.

Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household, built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone. In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord. And in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.

Message

Introduction

In over 40 years of ministry, I must have led and preached at over 80 covenant services (maybe over 100). There are six suggested readings for Covenant, and numerous other readings that are suitable. This year, Kinver Methodist Church is following a preaching series on Ephesians for the first six Sundays of 2026 so I was asked to focus on Ephesians 2, not a set reading for Covenant, but so many resonances to the key covenant themes.

The Covenant Service is one of the most demanding acts of Christian worship. It does not ask us what we feel, but what we will yield. In some of the places I have ministered, there have been a few people who have excused themselves from the covenant service, some because they feel the commitment to the Lord is too great and they cannot say with honesty “I am no longer my own but yours. Put me to what you will...”. Still, others decline to attend because they feel ashamed of their lives not matching the Christian ideal – they know they are not worthy. If they have had the courage to say this to me, I seek to get alongside them and encourage them to attend – the sense of being overwhelmed or ashamed are excellent attitudes to enter into an act of worship including the covenant promises. In our last Church Bible study on Ephesians 1 many of us were overwhelmed at the superlative language used by Paul to describe the generosity and lavishness of God. Today’s reading from Ephesians 2 tells us why we can pray the Covenant Prayer at all: because God has already acted decisively in Christ. Covenant renewal is not about trying harder in the coming year; it is about remembering who we are and whose we are.

1. From Death to Grace (Eph 2:1–9)

Paul begins with honesty: “You were dead in your trespasses and sins.”

Dead people do not negotiate covenants. They do not offer promises. They can only be raised. Before we get to the Covenant Prayer there is a period of confession and in that prayer, there are 14 different prompts of sinfulness. As I share in these services, I have found that I am guilty of all 14 areas of sinfulness. Paul’s words shout at me “you were dead in your sins”. I am aware that it is easy to read the words of the prayer and not take in the words. I do sometimes stop and expound these 14 prompts to help people to be honest and point out how easy it is to wrongly justify yourself. We also still live among a group of people who still justify their selfishness as Paul reminds us in verses 3-5 – “All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our flesh and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature deserving of wrath. But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions – it is by grace you have been saved.”

This is why the Covenant Prayer begins not with confidence but surrender: “We are no longer our own, but yours.”

We renew the covenant not because we are strong, but because God is merciful. Grace comes first. Always. And after we have confessed, the minister declares that we are forgiven and the words of the service include those words from 1 John 1:9, “God is faithful and just, and will forgive our sins, and cleanse us from all unrighteousness”. In that moment we are pure, cleansed from all unrighteousness. How amazing is that!

Covenant is not a contract between equals; it is a response to resurrection.

2. Made Alive for God’s Purposes (Eph 2:4–10)

Paul insists that grace does not leave us unchanged. In those few moments after we have been cleansed, we are pure, we are open to God speaking to us (the sin barrier has been removed). Perhaps in the quiet moment after the prayer, or when receiving bread and wine, listen for God to speak to you. If you rush on

too quickly you will miss him. Listening you may discover that we are created in Christ Jesus for good works, prepared by God. Is there something God wants you to do?

This gives meaning to the hardest lines of the Covenant Prayer: “Put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed for you or laid aside for you.” These are not words of despair. They are words of trust – trust that the God who raised us knows how our lives should be spent. No matter who you are or what you have done. God has a purpose for you and he longs to walk with you in it.

Grace does not remove obedience; it makes obedience possible.

3. Covenant Creates a People, Not Just Individuals (Eph 2:11–19)

Paul turns from “you” to “we”. Gentiles who were once far away are now members of the same household. Paul was talking about Jews and Gentiles. We have been part of a sinful community, now we are part of a community that is seeking to follow Jesus. We need to part of this new community.

The Covenant Service is intentionally corporate. We do not pray it privately because covenant is not private. We belong to God and to one another. As God has adopted us into his family, all the others who have also been adopted become our brothers and sisters. Paul says, “now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility...” His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace, and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility.

To renew covenant with God is to recommit ourselves to God’s people.

4. Christ Is the Mediator of the Covenant (Eph 2:13–18)

Paul repeats one phrase: “in Christ” many times in this letter.

Peace, access, reconciliation – all come through Him. Many times, Paul is praying for the unity of the body of Christ, we have a new family, all chosen by God and precious to him, and if that is true then whether we like them or not they are family.

We renew the covenant in Christ, not in our own resolve. The cross stands at the centre of this service, reminding us that covenant faithfulness rests on Christ’s obedience before it rests on ours.

The covenant holds because Christ holds us.

5. A Living Temple Renewing Its Dedication (Eph 2:20–22)

Paul ends with an image of the church as God’s dwelling place. “You are fellow citizens with God’s people and also members of his household built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone. In Christ the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord. And in Christ you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.”

The Covenant Service is the temple renewing its vows. God has not moved out. The question is whether we are willing to say again: “You are ours, and we are yours”.

Conclusion

We renew the covenant not to make God faithful to us, but to remember that God already is. Raised from death. Reconciled by the cross. Built together by the Spirit. Therefore, we dare to pray: “We are no longer our own, but yours.”

The Covenant

12 God made a covenant with the people of Israel, calling them to be a holy nation, chosen to bear witness to his steadfast love by finding delight in the law.

The covenant was renewed in Jesus Christ our Lord, in his life, work, death and resurrection. In him all people may be set free from sin and its power, and united in love and obedience.

and our hesitating witness for Christ:
