Reading: Isaiah 51:1-6 - Everlasting salvation for Zion

'Listen to me, you who pursue righteousness and who seek the Lord: look to the rock from which you were cut and to the quarry from which you were hewn; look to Abraham, your father, and to Sarah, who gave you birth. When I called him he was only one man, and I blessed him and made him many. The Lord will surely comfort Zion and will look with compassion on all her ruins; he will make her deserts like Eden, her wastelands like the garden of the Lord. Joy and gladness will be found in her, thanksgiving and the sound of singing. 'Listen to me, my people; hear me, my nation: instruction will go out from me; my justice will become a light to the nations. My righteousness draws near speedily, my salvation is on the way, and my arm will bring justice to the nations. The islands will look to me and wait in hope for my arm. Lift up your eyes to the heavens, look at the earth beneath; the heavens will vanish like smoke, the earth will wear out like a garment and its inhabitants die like flies. But my salvation will last for ever, my righteousness will never fail.

Reading: Matthew 15:21-28 - The faith of a Canaanite woman

Leaving that place, Jesus withdrew to the region of Tyre and Sidon. A Canaanite woman from that vicinity came to him, crying out, 'Lord, Son of David, have mercy on me! My daughter is demon-possessed and suffering terribly.' Jesus did not answer a word. So his disciples came to him and urged him, 'Send her away, for she keeps crying out after us.' He answered, 'I was sent only to the lost sheep of Israel.' The woman came and knelt before him. 'Lord, help me!' she said. He replied, 'It is not right to take the children's bread and toss it to the dogs.' 'Yes it is, Lord,' she said. 'Even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table.' Then Jesus said to her, 'Woman, you have great faith! Your request is granted.' And her daughter was healed at that moment.

Sermon

Jesus travelled to a certain region and a Canaanite woman came seeking help for her daughter. She was a Gentile, not part of the Jewish people. It's a difficult passage at first sight because, looking superficially at it we may think that Jesus was reluctant to grant the woman his attention. His words may even sound like a rejection to begin with. "It is not right to take the children's bread and throw it to the dogs." However, we need to look more deeply.

There were wild dogs living in the Mediterranean region, which could be fierce and dangerous. However, the Greek word used in this passage for dogs does not refer to these, but can literally be translated "little dogs". The Complete Jewish Bible translates this as "pet dogs". These were not the wild dogs to be avoided, they were part of a household and therefore entitled to food and provisions. I like to think of Jesus having a twinkle in his eye as he said this, that actually far from rejecting the woman's request he actually looked with love and compassion and humour.

So what's going on here? Jesus may have delayed the answer to her request in order to draw out faith and understanding. Sometimes our prayers are not answered straight away, or in the way that we would have liked. When God allows this to happen, it may be because there is some treasure for us to pick up on the journey, which we would have missed if we had reached our destination immediately. Maybe there is some way in which we or our prayers change for the better over time, which would not have happened if our request had been granted without delay. Have you experienced this? Over time, you are praying for a particular situation, which seems not to be changing as you would like, but you keep on praying. You find that over time your prayers become deeper and more mature and more full of understanding. When we pray like this our situation maybe does not change, but we do! Gradually our prayers grow from a simple request for a difficulty-free life to a prayer for God to make us stronger and able to meet the situation with his resources. It leads us to a deeper communion with our Lord and a greater spiritual maturity and understanding. Sometimes only after this do we find that our circumstances improve too. Back to our reading today: Jesus, through his delay and questioning, draws out the strong faith, spiritual depth and

humility of this Canaanite woman. Jesus then proclaims that her request is granted! Her daughter is made well. In the delay, the disciples (and we) learn important lessons about faith, patience, persistence and humility as well as the mission of Jesus.

There is another context to consider as well, and that is the broad sweep of God's plans in history and the future.

Last year one of my astronomical society friends who also has a liking for rocks gave me a geological heritage trail leaflet about Dudley. It wasn't at all what I expected. I thought I would find descriptions of various natural outcrops of rock in the area, and that the Wren's Nest reserve would feature strongly. It was something else entirely! It was actually about public structures in the town centre such as civic buildings, shops, banks, cobblestones etc., and what they were made from, roofed or clad with. It described various structures and gave details of types of rock, where in the world they came from, and how many millions of years ago those rocks formed. Shop fronts that I would have walked past without any thought now took on a different meaning as I learned that materials that I might have imagined being made in a factory actually were natural. I learned where they were quarried from, how old they were and the natural processes by which they were formed. As I considered this leaflet with interest, a Bible verse came to mind, which is actually part of our Isaiah reading today: Consider the rock from which you were hewn, the quarry from which you were dug. The passage then goes on to speak of Abraham and Sarah as father and mother of God's people, from whom the Lord's rulership and deliverance would go forth to coasts and islands and beyond, even to the very heavens.

If we want to understand who we are and where we are going then we also need to understand where we came from. Our faith, our church, this wonderful worldwide community of which we are part didn't arise in a vacuum. It wasn't an afterthought on God's part. It always was God's plan!

Here's the key point: God had a plan of rescue for the world, and right from the beginning this included all people on earth. In fact, many scriptures point to this blessing being not just for people but all creatures and every created thing, the entire fabric of the universe. Surely this is good news for the present generation living in a world that seems to be straining under the weight of human activity. God's rescue plan is worldwide, universal.. but there's a proper sequence.

God looked for a person through whom he could work, and tested Abraham by asking him to leave his home and relatives and go to a land that he would show him, in order that he would be blessed, be the father of a great nation and be a blessing to all people on earth. We can read about these promises in the book of Genesis from chapter 12 onwards. Abraham believed and obeyed and became the father of the nation of Israel and the Jewish people to whom God gave the Law and Prophets, and through whom eventually came Jesus, the Messiah, who is the Saviour of all. Here's the thing: God started with one man, then a nation, then all people, then the ultimate future fulfilment incorporates the whole cosmos. God called the Jewish people to be a source of blessing to all the world, and that calling has never been revoked. God's treasures were never intended to be limited to one nation, but given to all people. We as modern day Christian believers do not replace God's original people, but are joined to them, as the spiritual descendants of Abraham. To make this really personal: God's plan of blessing included us from the start. It included YOU. From the beginning of time God saw you in advance and loved you. He knew when and where you would be born, where you would live and understands where you are now and what is going on in your life. His plan of blessing always encompassed you. We are included, through Christ, in God's people, and given a part in his universal salvation plan.

When Jesus spoke to the Canaanite woman he already fully understood the Divine plan of inclusion for all. If there was any hesitation about whether at this time he should help a non-Jewish person it was a matter not of inclusion but of sequence. There was a proper order to things. He knew that he would be the Saviour of all nations but that it would begin with his ministry to the Jews of Israel. Later, the risen Jesus

was to commission his disciples to preach the gospel to all nations, beginning in Jerusalem but to go from there to Judaea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.

Through the story of this wonderful, eloquent, intelligent, witty Canaanite lady we can learn many lessons, including: trust, persistence in prayer, humility and the importance of not being offended or giving up when God doesn't do straight away what we think he should. She persisted in trust and received what she asked for. In the wider picture we learn humility and gratitude and reverence concerning the Jewish roots of our faith and God's plan of inclusion for all. We remember that God knew and loved us from the very beginning, incorporated us into his eternal family and made us part of his universal restoration plan.
