Reading: Mark 9:30-37

They left that place and passed through Galilee. Jesus did not want anyone to know where they were, because he was teaching his disciples. He said to them, 'The Son of Man is going to be delivered into the hands of men. They will kill him, and after three days he will rise.' But they did not understand what he meant and were afraid to ask him about it.

They came to Capernaum. When he was in the house, he asked them, 'What were you arguing about on the road?' But they kept quiet because on the way they had argued about who was the greatest. Sitting down, Jesus called the Twelve and said, 'Anyone who wants to be first must be the very last, and the servant of all.' He took a little child whom he placed among them. Taking the child in his arms, he said to them, 'Whoever welcomes one of these little children in my name welcomes me; and whoever welcomes me does not welcome me but the one who sent me.'

Reflection

This reading seems to suggest that, for Christians, ambition is a dirty word. It is condemned by Jesus - and in a reading we will hear later - by St James. But if we look into the readings it is not ambition that is condemned - it is false ambition. Ambition in itself is a good thing as long as it doesn't get out of hand but some people are so driven by ambition that they are consumed by it and whilst they may be successful, sometimes they leave a trail of broken relationships behind them. Those who are consumed by ambition often sacrifice everything to attain the goal of success. They neglect their own personal development, they neglect family life, relationships - and even life itself.

It is good to have goals - to want to succeed in business or in a career - as long as it's not a question of succeeding at all costs. Jesus said 'What good will it do a man to gain the whole world if he loses himself in the process.' In today's gospel we have an example of false ambition. Here we see the apostles fighting over who would be first in Jesus' kingdom. False ambition creates conflict and division and damage in the community and so Jesus gave them a lecture on the meaning of true greatness. He didn't tell them that they should not seek greatness in his kingdom, He just showed them where true greatness was to be found. It is to be found in serving others, especially the weaker members of the community. He didn't abolish ambition, He redefined it as a desire to serve.

Service implies that you're not just there for yourself, you have to be there for others. A servant has to get used to being taken for granted and that's not very popular today. I'm sure that all of us - at some time or another - have felt taken for granted. Society has become very materialistic and individualist and yet the best prize that life has to offer is the chance to work at something that is worth doing rather than simply self-interest. Jesus said that whoever wants to be first must place himself last of all and be the servant of all. Then he took a child and made him stand in front of them. He put his arms around him and said to them 'Whoever welcomes in my name one of these children welcomes me - and whoever welcomes me welcomes him who sent me'.

When Nelson Mandela was a student lawyer in Johannesburg he had a friend whose name was Paul Mahabane. Mahabane was a member of the African National Congress - the ANC - and had the reputation of being a radical. One day they were standing outside their local post office when the local magistrate - a white man in his sixties - approached Mahabane and asked him to go inside and buy him some stamps. It was quite common in those days for a white person to call upon a black person to perform a chore. Mahabane refused and the magistrate was offended. His face turned red with anger. 'Do you not know who I am?' he asked. 'It is not necessary to know who you are,' Mahabane replied, 'I know what you are.' The magistrate boiled over with rage and said, 'You will pay dearly for this' and then walked away. The white man was convinced that he was superior to Mahabane simply because he was a magistrate and it was clear that it had become second nature to him to expect others, especially black people, to serve him.

We tend to define and evaluate people by the jobs that they do. So if we learn, for instance, that a person is a doctor or a lawyer then they go up in our estimation. But if we learn that a person is what we might call an ordinary worker then we don't see them the same light. But how silly is that? I'm sure we are all guilty of it but the most important thing is the kind of human being behind the job. A few months ago we were chatting to my son about his job and we asked him whether he had ever thought of applying to become a QC and he said, 'Not really because if I became a QC, although I could earn more money, I would not be able to do the work I am doing now. I would have to take on more prestigious cases. Whereas I want to be able to help the sort of people that I help now.' He has always been for the 'under-dog' and he does lots of human rights work involved with housing and is over the moon when things turn out well for the poor individual he is representing.

The mistake that the apostles made was to put the job or the position first. In their eyes the greatest among them was the one who had the highest position. They obviously thought that Jesus would set up an earthly kingdom and so each one wanted to get a top position in that kingdom. But Jesus told them that his kingdom was not about seeking honour or glory for oneself but about serving others. If they were prepared to serve others then by all means they could have a top place in his kingdom. But they would not be sitting on high chairs or soft seats. They were more likely to be down on their knees with a bowl of water and a towel 'washing the feet of the little ones' - the weakest members of the community.

It's not what we do, but what we are that is important. Our self worth should not depend on the work that we do. We can all have an attitude of self worth and accomplishment regardless of what we do or did for living. There is a lot of talk nowadays about the importance of self esteem, but if we want to feel proud of ourselves we've got to do things we can be proud of. Ambition in itself is a good thing. The question is, what are we to be ambitious about? St Paul says be ambitious for the higher gifts and the greatest of these is love. Lord fill our hearts with your love so that we may be capable of serving others and this service will guarantee us a place in your kingdom. **Amen.**

Reading: James 3

Not many of you should become teachers, my fellow believers, because you know that we who teach will be judged more strictly. We all stumble in many ways. Anyone who is never at fault in what they say is perfect, able to keep their whole body in check.

When we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we can turn the whole animal. Or take ships as an example. Although they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are steered by a very small rudder wherever the pilot wants to go. Likewise, the tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts. Consider what a great forest is set on fire by a small spark. The tongue also is a fire, a world of evil among the parts of the body. It corrupts the whole body, sets the whole course of one's life on fire, and is itself set on fire by hell.

All kinds of animals, birds, reptiles and sea creatures are being tamed and have been tamed by mankind, but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With the tongue we praise our Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings, who have been made in God's likeness. Out of the same mouth come praise and cursing.

My brothers and sisters, this should not be. Can both fresh water and salt water flow from the same spring? My brothers and sisters, can a fig-tree bear olives, or a grapevine bear figs? Neither can a salt spring produce fresh water.

Who is wise and understanding among you? Let them show it by their good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom. But if you harbour bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not boast about it or deny the truth. Such 'wisdom' does not come down from heaven but is earthly, unspiritual, demonic. For where you have envy and selfish ambition, there you find disorder and every evil practice. But the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere. Peacemakers who sow in peace reap a harvest of righteousness.
