Advent Candle Liturgy

"Jesus said, 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life'."

Advent 4 - Candle of Waiting with Faithfulness

The first candle reminds us of the light of expectant hope of the prophets. The second candle reminds us of the patience of John the Baptist who proclaimed Christ's coming in faith. The third candle reminds us of the great light and joy which filled Mary as she was chosen by God. The fourth candle reminds us of the **faithfulness of God** who in Christ has created a new covenant with us.

[After the Candle is lit we pray]

O God, when we think of the birth of your Son we think of love and light and gifts and happy times. But, most of all, we think of Him, as our constant companion – our Guide and Helper. May we faithfully live the way Jesus has taught us so that we may show the real meaning of his birth, life, death and resurrection. **Amen**

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness - on them light has shined. For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. His authority shall grow continually, and there shall be endless peace for the throne of David and his kingdom. He will establish and uphold it with justice and with righteousness from this time onwards and for evermore. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this.

In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) And everyone went to his own town to register. So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn.

Reading: John 1:1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. In him was life, and that life was the light of men. 5 The light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not understood it. There came a man who was sent from God; his name was John. He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all men might believe. He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light. 9 The true light that gives light to every man was coming into the world. He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him. He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. Yet to all who received him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God-- children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God. The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the One and Only, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.

Christmas Message

It was back in 2017 I was speaking to an optician and suggested they should get ready for an advertising campaign in 2019 along the lines of "Get ready for 2020 vision- get your eyes tested now." Who had 2020 vision for this past year, 2020? No one on earth could have predicted the year we have been living through as individuals, communities, countries, indeed as a world. Within this country the year began with Brexit and it is ending with Brexit on the news. In between the news has been dominated by weather and health; two subjects people normally like to talk about – but perhaps not this year.

Can you remember the weather of this past year and what has happened or have you forgotten many of the events of 2020? The weather caused many people to have to leave homes because of flooding both in February and August and then during the summer there was a heat wave, which many could not cope with. On the 7th Dec there was a Panorama programme looking back at the year and projecting forwards as to how things could be in the future if we do not address the issues around global warming and the resulting changes to weather patterns around the world but particularly on our own island.

During Lent some of us were reading a book by Ruth Valerio, "Saying Yes to life", which raised such issues but due to the Corona Virus the groups studies had to stop. This year, for many, has been one of the hardest of their lives due to the limitations on activities, fear of catching Covid, and for others living with the results of people close to them contracting Covid. I have not been in the past, and I am still not, one who would get to the end of a year and think "I'm glad that one is over a new year will mark a change." The truth is the move from 2020 to 2021 will not make the slightest difference in the reality of the situation unless behaviour and attitudes change amongst the majority of the people in the world.

We need a world where people are less "self-centred" and more "other-centred". This is the order God created human beings to live in. To live in social community and interacting with others was and is God's purpose for humanity. "Let us create humankind in OUR image." God is community at the centre of His being, our Trinitarian God. The Christmas message reminds us of many things within it including the the poor and the wealthy, the weak and the powerful, a world of political oppression and family anxieties. It was into such a world a baby was born who is the focal point of the story and a message of hope in a difficult world.

Many years later when John reflected on the life of Jesus he wrote — "the light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it." Without light 2020 vision is useless for in total darkness we cannot see anything however good or bad our eyes. The light of Christ gives us a way to look at the reality of life with a positive outlook for we know that God is good and faithful and ultimately love wins. Many a film and book will want to portray that message, but it is in the words of the Bible that the truth is revealed upon which such hope, in books and films, can place hope.

The one born in a stable, who died on a cross, arose out of a tomb and ascended into the heart of the Godhead for all time, spoke a message which included; "love the Lord your God with your whole beings and love your neighbour"; "love one another as I have loved you." That is Jesus, he is why we can enter 2021 with hope; despite what happens with weather and health God is still God and Jesus is the Saviour of the world, his message is still true "Love is the ultimate."
