Call to Worship - Colossians 1:15-18 - Christ Supreme

Jesus is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything.

Reading: Acts 2:37-47

Now when they heard this, they were cut to the heart and said to Peter and to the other apostles, "Brothers, what should we do?" Peter said to them, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you, for your children, and for all who are far away, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to him." And he testified with many other arguments and exhorted them, saying, "Save yourselves from this corrupt generation." So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added. They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.

Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

Sermon

If you are anything like me, I seem to have spent so much of my recent time wrestling with our Covid context, wishing things were different instead of listening to Jesus, who reconciles us to our situation and calls us to find God's purpose in the day that is before us.

I wonder then how does the church find its feet in the midst of lockdown and as we attempt to emerge from lockdown in due course? In response to this I find myself drawn to the early days of the church in the book of Acts. There are strong parallels as we witness the disciples locked down, fearful of the power of the Romans and the Jewish Council, knowing that to go out and proclaim their risen Lord will be very dangerous.

Often - when read this passage from Acts there is a temptation to respond by trying to recreate the exact community it describes. To take the aspects of this particular Christian community and create from them a prescription for ourselves and communities around us.

PROBLEM - by doing this we take a story of faith and turn it into a standard of obedience. We must be this way – exactly – or we are not doing it right? One commentator writes: it's like turning the wine of joy at the wedding of Cana back into the water of ritual.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer writes about this passage in Acts where he says: Christian brother (and sister)hood is not an ideal which we must realize; rather it is a reality created by God in Christ in which we may participate. In other words – as we explore Acts in the context of Lockdown to see what we can learn and what comfort and guidance the early church bring us, as it emerges whilst under pressure and in and from Lockdown... The trick – according to Bonhoeffer is not to try and copy what they did - rather we are called to create our own reality today, our own version, rooted in Christ's teaching and example. Dietrich Bonhoeffer was born in 1906 to a prominent German family. He was a tall man, with an athletic physique and a round boyish face. With his mother's blue eyes and blond hair he was a potentially perfectly fit for the Third Reich.

BUT Bonhoeffer was a man of deep faith who knew all about lockdown... He became a Lutheran pastor and with the rise to power of Hitler in 1933, Bonhoeffer became known for his staunch resistance to Nazi dictatorship and his vocal opposition to Hitler's genocidal persecution of the Jews. Sadly, around him the national protestant union of churches passed a resolution such that pastors and church officials of Jewish descent were removed from their posts. SO he became an outspoken early member of the Confessing Church which reaffirmed Christ at its head – not Hitler. Cutting - long story short, in 1943 he was arrested by the Gestapo, imprisoned and sadly killed in 1945 just as the regime was collapsing...

In the face of intense pressure, locked down and at great risk Bonhoeffer sought the renewal of the German church. By focussing on these themes from Acts 2:

First, focus on what really matters. ie Get the basics right V37 Now when they heard this... THIS being Peter's Sermon to the crowd proclaiming and affirming Jesus as the Messiah. When under pressure – facing the unknown, let's bring Jesus back to the centre of church life and personal faith. Lets affirm who

Jesus is, what Jesus has done for us. Returning to the core of the journey of faith: V38 Repent and be baptised so that we may be forgiven and can receive the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Second - Bonhoeffer says: Rejoice. Remember and recall the greatness of God V43 Awe came upon everyone. Bonhoefer wrote to his fiancé from prison saying: be cheerful, be patient and brave." He went on: "even amidst hardship, a joyful optimism can prevail." In his famous prison poem, "Who am I?" the opening stanza reads: "They often tell me I would step from my cell's confinement calmly, cheerfully, firmly, like a squire from his country-house."

To rejoice is in God is to reaffirm our perspective. Whatever our troubles, hardship or loss, God is with us & worthy of our praise.

Third, Bonehoeffer says: embrace optimism. If you re-read verses 44-47, This is an incredible image of optimism. You can just feel it rising from the page. Despite all the first Christians had been through. Bonhoeffer's approach to prison life was not to allow the confinement to restrict his activity. He literally, did not sit still while waiting for his hope for freedom to materialise.

I wonder then - how we together might find optimism, be optimistic, share optimism with each other and with the world around us that is so desperately in need of optimism right now? I don't have the answers – but let us seek that optimism together...

As we seek to find our feet as a church IN lockdown, may we keep Christ at the centre of all we do, rejoicing in God and sharing the optimism of our faith with a world in need. Amen. (Based on original work by Brian Rosner - Principal of Ridley College, Melbourne.)

We remember other countries in the world where there is unrest - we remember especially North and South Korea, Iran, Egypt, Iraq and Afghanistan. We pray for sincere, honest and trustworthy leaders. We live in hope and seek to bring hope to these troubled areas of the world.

L: The Lord is here **R:** The Lord is present

Jesus the word - friend and sustainer of those for whom life is fading, those who are weighed down with grief, smooth the uneven ground for the weak and the lonely. For those whose jobs and lives are under threat in these difficult times. We pray especially for the strength of communities and families - that we may as a Church play our part in the cohesion of our local communities. Holy Spirit speak with us and for us as we bring to God those whom we name on our lips and in the silence of our hearts and those whose troubles are known only to you;
