Prayer of adoration and praise

Reading: Joshua 24:1-2a, 14-18

Then Joshua assembled all the tribes of Israel at Shechem. He summoned the elders, leaders, judges and officials of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. Joshua said to all the people, "This is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says: 'Long ago your ancestors, including Terah the father of Abraham and Nahor, lived beyond the Euphrates River and worshiped other gods.'

"Now fear the Lord and serve him with all faithfulness. Throw away the gods your ancestors worshiped beyond the Euphrates River and in Egypt, and serve the Lord. But if serving the Lord seems undesirable to you, then choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served beyond the Euphrates, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you are living. But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." Then the people answered, "Far be it from us to forsake the Lord to serve other gods! It was the Lord our God himself who brought us and our parents up out of Egypt, from that land of slavery, and performed those great signs before our eyes. He protected us on our entire journey and among all the nations through which we travelled. And the Lord drove out before us all the nations, including the Amorites, who lived in the land. We too will serve the Lord, because he is our God."

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Reading: John 6:56-69

Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me, and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me and I live because of the Father, so the one who feeds on me will live because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven. Your ancestors ate manna and died, but whoever feeds on this bread will live forever." He said this while teaching in the synagogue in Capernaum. On hearing it, many of his disciples said, "This is a hard teaching. Who can accept it?" Aware that his disciples were grumbling about this, Jesus said to them, "Does this offend you? Then what if you see the Son of Man ascend to where he was before! The Spirit gives life; the flesh counts for nothing. The words I have spoken to you—they are full of the Spirit and life. Yet there are some of you who do not believe." For Jesus had known from the beginning which of them did not believe and who would betray him. He went on to say, "This is why I told you that no one can come to me unless the Father has enabled them." From this time many of his disciples turned back and no longer followed him. "You do not want to leave too, do you?" Jesus asked the Twelve. Simon Peter answered him, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and to know that you are the Holy One of God."

Sermon

Joshua the chosen leader

There are situations that we associate with different characters. If I was to say the name of Joshua to you what event in his life would come to mind first of all? Probably you would start humming to yourself "Joshua fought the battle of Jericho." Was that the biggest event in his life? Is that he would like to be remembered for?

In the history of God's people there are a number of characters that come to mind as outstanding figures. Abraham and Moses were part of Israel's early history. They belonged to a time when the people were desert nomads. They lived with their flocks, moving on when they needed new pasture. When they became settler in the land of Canaan it was a dramatic change to their way of life. They were to give up their tents and their mobility and build houses. Their previous security had been based on being a travelling people; in this new age their security was to be centred more upon the land. They became property owners. It was at this point in history a man called Joshua became a towering figure; the man who succeeded Moses as the leader of his people, Israel.

We know how Moses led the people of Israel out of bondage in Egypt and how he led them for 40 years of wandering in the wilderness, the nomadic people. He moulded them through the Law into an organised community. God did not permit Moses to enter the Promised Land. The person given the responsibility to lead the people into their new homeland was his apprentice, Joshua. Joshua led the people across the river Jordan and commanded the invasion and conquest of Canaan. After the invasion Joshua divided the land into regions and these defined areas were allocated to each of the Israelite tribes. The story of Joshua is one long military adventure, or, a long tale of violence depending upon how it is looked upon.

There are leaders for different times; leaders with different skills. Having the rightly skilled and gifted person at the helm is of importance, Winston Churchill was the war leader in the 1940's but at the end of the war he was quickly replaced in July 1945.

The football season has begun; when will the first manager lose their position? No club appoints a manager who they think will fail. There are clubs who appoint a manager who is successful but at some point they lose their way and the team loses matches and so the search goes on for a new person to manage the team; one with some similar but also some different gifts and talents. In many sectors of society the same is true.

I like the theory of the "Peter Principle" which says a person gets promoted until they reach their level of incompetence and then stays put. Extrapolating that further can imply we are eventually lead by incompetents. In Church communities as in other areas of life finding the right people to lead is of importance, lay and ordained . "The God person for the now," is what is needed. Is God calling you to stand up and become a leader – or to sit down from leading?

Joshua and a choosing people

When Joshua is an old man and the country is resting from war he calls the leaders of the tribes together. He calls them to gather at Shechem, an ancient Sanctuary. We heard the story in our reading. The elders, leaders, judges and scribes are called to listen to the last farewell of their distinguished leader; his stepping aside speech; his assessing of his achievements. Joshua does not recall his military victories; he does not ask the people to cherish what he has done for them. Instead he asks the people to make a choice as to whom they would serve. Would they follow the false gods of the land in which they lived or the God who had led them to the land. It was not an easy choice. Remember the people's understanding of God was not like ours. They did not have a written "history' of a people to refer to. They had no Jesus to refer to — though Jesus is the same name as Joshua. In their years of wandering their God had provided for their needs. Canaan was a fertile and agriculturally wealthy country. The people worshipped fertility gods. Therein lay a challenge for Joshua's people. Were they to trust that their nomadic God could grow crops or worship the local fertility gods? They had no concept of one universal creator God.

Did Joshua want to be remembered as a great military leader who brought his people to the Promised Land or as the prophet who brought his people to choose God again? Joshua is tired, old, facing death. He has seen a great amount of bloodshed; he has seen many buildings and towns destroyed; he has seen countless disfigured bodies. He could not sing of the glories of war. He is more concerned, at this point in his life, with the decisions of the heart. Joshua knew that decisions and allegiances need renewing. People do not just stay loyal to a cause by continuing to exist.

Israel Zangwill, a British author at the forefront of cultural Zionism during the 19th Century, who went on to reject the search for a Jewish homeland in Palestine, observed about the Jewish tradition; "We are not the chosen people, but the choosing people."

Joshua asked his people to choose, and as he does so he declares before them his own choice to serve the Lord. It was here that Joshua won the most important battle of his life; he leads his people to a choice of fidelity and faithfulness as they declare; "we too will serve the Lord, for he is our God." In the Methodist Church ministers do not retire, they ask permission of their peers to "sit down", to stop being a person of travel going wherever the church desires them to go. They find a place to settle. When asking for such permission many will tell something of their story of ministry, perhaps how they want to be remembered. Some can be very amusing depending upon how the story is told others can be very challenging.

One story I remember spoke of a ministry that saw the closure of at least one church building in every appointment in which he served. It could seem that the story was of failure. That was far from the truth for when he left each appointment the church was better equipped for growth than when he arrived. The story of this ministry was a challenge to those who listened. To be faithful to God does not always bring immediate earthly success but the longer-term is of importance. How would you like to be remembered?

Jesus People – choosing to stay

The choice placed before the people by Joshua is also echoed in the Gospel reading from John 6. Jesus asks his followers whether they wish to stay with him or join the community of unbelievers. After hearing the teaching of Jesus on the bread of life many of the followers express their complete confusion. They find what he is saying disturbing and many, who have followed, choose to walk away. As Joshua placed a choice before the tribes of Israel so Jesus places the choice before the 12 apostles, his closest followers. They could choose to walk away, no blame attached, closing the book on the past, or they could choose to stick with him.

The twelve tribes said they could not reject the Lord after all he had done for them, Peter turns to Jesus and asks "to whom would we go, you have the words of eternal life, you are the truth about God." The apostles exercise their freedom of choice and choose to stay with Jesus.

Jesus respects freedom of choice; he knows that past choices can become old and tired and can be abandoned in the melee of life. The parable of the sower comes to mind.

Past choices have to be kept alive by new commitment. The value of the Methodist Covenant Service is that it reminds us to reassess our commitment to Christ; our choice of allegiance.

The Old Testament prophets called he people of God to return to the Lord again and again. Peter recommitted to following Jesus on the beach after the resurrection.

In our faith journey there will be times when our faith is challenged and we have to make a choice; do we abandon the God who has brought us thus far, or trust him to bring our journey to a safe conclusion. Keep choosing Jesus; "as for me and my household we will serve the Lord."
