Thanksgiving

In the midst of the current crisis it may seem hard but it is always good to come to God with Thanksgiving. Especially because God is ever faithful. In v16 God says: 'when I see the rainbow in the heavens, I will remember the covenant I have made with you.' In these weeks of lockdown we have been fortunate that we do not have to look as high as the heavens to see that rainbow before us. It has been in the windows of houses, on bus stops and school walls or even chalked on the pavement. I am sure there will have been times when we have wondered if God has forgotten us and so maybe it's no bad thing to have a reminder of that rainbow covenant low to the ground where we can see it, even if our head is down. Take a moment to express a word of thanksgiving to God.

Lament

Meanwhile, we have been locked up and locked out of our churches, of fellowship, of care and friendship. Locked out of schools and clubs and shops. We have seen refugees fleeing violence, people in unsafe homes and economies in crisis. Covid 19 has been much more than an inconvenience. People have died, families have grieved apart, children without the benefits of technology have fallen behind. Older people have been even more isolated. And many communities have been forced to live hand to mouth. To name these things is to tell the truth in God's presence about the hopes we had which are lost. To lament breaks the temptation to be victims, it recognises that our stories of harm and loss are part of God's story. That God, in Christ knows what it means to be isolated and vulnerable. And so our lament allows our hearts to break alongside God's heart. So I invite you to quietly take a moment to bring something you have lost in lockdown, your lost hopes, your laments to God.

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Reading: Acts 16:25-34 – Paul and Silas released from prison

About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the other prisoners were listening to them. Suddenly there was such a violent earthquake that the foundations of the prison were shaken. At once all the prison doors flew open, and everyone's chains came loose. The jailer woke up, and when he saw the prison doors open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself because he thought the prisoners had escaped. But Paul shouted, 'Don't harm yourself! We are all here!' The jailer called for lights, rushed in and fell trembling before Paul and Silas. He then brought them out and asked, 'Sirs, what must I do to be saved?' They replied, 'Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved – you and your household.' Then they spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all the others in his house. At that hour of the night the jailer took them and washed their wounds; then immediately he and all his household were baptised. The jailer brought them into his house and set a meal before them; he was filled with joy because he had come to believe in God – he and his whole household.

Reading: John 20:19-29 – Jesus appears to his disciples

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you!' After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord. Again Jesus said, 'Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you.' And with that he breathed on them and said, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven.' Now Thomas (also known as Didymus), one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord!' But he said to them, 'Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe.' A week later his disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you!' Then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe.' Thomas said to him, 'My Lord and my God!' Then Jesus told him, 'Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed.'

Sermon – Freedom in lockdown

I am a glass half full kind of person. And a few weeks ago, whilst on holiday I began to excitedly plan for a return to worship. I imagined this would be a time of great rejoicing and release after so many months of lockdown. I picked the great new Testament story of Paul and Silas, when the doors were opened and the chains fell off - mighty, liberating God acting in the world. Their lockdown ended they were set free!

I realise now that I was a little naive and not long after returning from holiday new restrictions were announced in many parts of the country as a second spike of Covid emerged and many experienced a loss of freedom again! I thought about stepping back and abandoning these readings and then, by God's grace, I perhaps began to see what God wanted me to see...

I wonder, did you notice what happened when Paul and Silas were set free? We read from verse 26: 'suddenly there was an earthquake, immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were unfasten. v28 but Paul shouted in a loud voice do not harm yourself for we are all here.' They were set free, but they stayed where they were. They stayed in captivity! In lockdown! Why?

St Paul's Christian journey had led him to a new understanding of freedom. He knew that God's freedom is different from ours. That God's freedom did not require him to be physically free. And in this particular case Paul also knew that his freedom had consequences v27 'when the jailer woke up and saw the prison doors wide open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, since he supposed that the prisoners had escaped.' Paul and Silas chose to stay, and by staying the jailer and his household were saved. Scripture tells us they heard the good news of Jesus, believed and were baptised without delay. If we look at Paul's life we can see that he was in fact constantly in and out of lockdown. Indeed after this passage he was released and then arrested again, a number of times. And yet he did not allow this physical lockdown to prevent his continued ministry.

We may yearn to return to what we consider as 'normal' but that doesn't really exist anymore. There is no going back. And in truth Paul's life reflects our life. We are all in and out of lockdown in one way or another throughout our lives. At different times we may find ourselves bound to pride, envy, money, power, loss, self-image or the temptation of sin - all of which can control our lives. And there is only one person who can release us from this lockdown and enable us to find purpose and that is Jesus Christ.

One day whilst on holiday I saw a bird high-up sitting on a Telegraph wire. It was a windy day and as the wire swung back and forth I could see the bird clinging more tightly to its unstable perch. The wire swung more and more and at the very moment when it seemed like disaster would strike, when the bird was most buffeted and at risk, it suddenly spread its wings and flew.

Sisters and brothers, we are seemingly trapped in a long Covid interim period where we cannot control its length or direction. But Christ, who appears to us as he appeared to the disciples locked in the upper room, offers us a new understanding of freedom. At the very worst moment he offers us a chance to let go and to fly... Jesus offers us the opportunity to find freedom within lockdown. Jesus offers us the confidence of Paul and Silas who found salvation's purpose whilst remaining in lockdown. In our lockdown Christ bring us his presence, faith in the face of doubt and his peace. With Christ as our guide - we can and we will endure, we can be free and we will find purpose. I wonder if we can be faithful enough to let go, to spread our wings and to fly... Amen
