Reading: John 15:1-17 The vine and the branches

'I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful. You are already clean because of the word I have spoken to you. Remain in me, as I also remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me.

'I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. If you do not remain in me, you are like a branch that is thrown away and withers; such branches are picked up, thrown into the fire and burned. If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. This is to my Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be my disciples.

'As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Now remain in my love. If you keep my commands, you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commands and remain in his love. I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete. My command is this: love each other as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command. I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead, I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you. You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit – fruit that will last – and so that whatever you ask in my name the Father will give you. This is my command: love each other.

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Reflection

This week is the week of prayer for Christian unity and it rightly focuses on the unity of the universal church, that is the visible and tangible part of Christ's body. People often ask why are there so many different denominations. 1 Corinthians chapter 12 answers this in part, as the human body is made up of different parts all with their own role to play so the church is made up of different people and denominations all with their own role.

What binds us together is that we are all under the same head or rooted in the same vine. Jesus said 'I am the vine you are the branches'

In the book of Exodus God calls Moses to go to his people and Moses asked God for a name that he could say when he was asked who sent him, the answer was I am who I am. In John's Gospel this idea is taken forward and Jesus makes various claims about himself as 'I am'. As God, He said I am the Good Shepherd I am the gate for the sheep

I am the true vine
I am the bread of life
I am the way, the truth and the life
I am the resurrection and the life

He also said 'I am the vine you are the branches'

In our reading Jesus said I am the true vine. In the Old Testament, Israel, the people of God are likened to a vine. It was their role to represent God to the world around them. Israel was the means by which God revealed himself to the surrounding nations, it was through their laws, customs and behaviours that God could be seen by others. In Jeremiah 2(21) Gods says to the Jews "I planted you as a choice vine from the purest stock. How then did you become degenerate and become a wild vine?" Jesus is saying that he is the true vine, the true representative of God, the one through whom God will show himself. Through him we can know/ see the character and nature of God.

Jesus says he is the vine itself from which the branches come. Jesus talked about situations and metaphors which his listeners would easily understand, he used everyday things to illustrate his teaching. As the people were familiar with sheep and shepherds so they would know about vines, about vineyards and wine presses. Now I'm no gardener but I do know that it is the vine stock itself which is important. The vine stock comes out of the ground and the branches come from that. In pruning it is the branches that are pruned, the branches are totally dependant on the stock, they can no longer live or bear fruit without a vital connection between stem and branch. The vine itself though can live without the branches and will grow new ones to replace ones lost.

Jesus is the vine, we are the branches.

So if we are the branches we are pruned to become healthy branches, we are pruned to bear fruit. It would be easy to speculate on what pruning means, is it any hardship or challenge that can make us better people? Is it in circumstance, the loss of a job, bereavement, illness any kind of struggle, is that why at times life never seems easy? Does God allow it, impose it or work through it? What is the fruit, is it bringing other people to know God, is it the fruits of the Spirit, love joy peace etc. We, like the branches are dependant on the vine, we can not live without being sustained by the stock. It is like any electrical equipment, unless it is plugged into an electricity supply it is useless, an electric lamp, a heater, won't work unless it is plugged in and switched on, in the same way we as Christians are dependant on Jesus. We need him for life and growth, we need the nourishment he offers, nourishment that comes through worship, that comes through teaching, that comes through prayer, that comes through pursuing knowledge of God and his ways. Without all of these we become dry and brittle.

Jesus is the vine we are the branches

A vine or indeed any plant has more than one branch. A tree has many branches the older the tree the more the branches criss cross, supporting each others weight, forming a canopy giving the whole strength to withstand bad weather. The Christian life isn't something you do on your own but it is one to be lived in a community, it is not something we do alone. We are all branches coming from the vine and together we are part of the foliage. We are the branches and as such the Church, Christ's body, is made up of many branches all sustaining each other, enabling each other to grow through fellowship and love. As individual branches we need to be rooted in the vine, as the body of Christ, we need to be rooted in the vine. Perhaps as a people of God, as individuals pruning needs to be done. As God is the good shepherd caring for his sheep, so he is the gardener lovingly tending his plants.

Jesus is the vine we are the branches

Vines are not free standing but need support on which to grow, a vine needs wires, a trellis of some kind to hold its weight. That is what the church structures are for, that is what the buildings are for. That is the business of the church meeting, church councils, of the pastoral visitors, of the Ministers, they are there to help us grow as branches, to help us grow as the vine to enables us to bear fruit.

Without our normal structures we have to rely on each other. As we grow and mature we become closer together we realise that we are one in Jesus in the vine and through this others will see the love of Jesus because as our next hymn says we can only stand in him.
