Nevertheless, there will be no more gloom for those who were in distress. In the past he humbled the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the future he will honour Galilee of the nations, by the Way of the Sea, beyond the Jordan—

The people walking in darkness
have seen a great light;
on those living in the land of deep darkness
a light has dawned.
You have enlarged the nation
and increased their joy;
they rejoice before you
as people rejoice at the harvest,
as warriors rejoice
when dividing the plunder.
For as in the day of Midian's defeat,
you have shattered
the yoke that burdens them,
the bar across their shoulders,

Isaiah's oracle speaks of the Lord's redemption for Judeans living in exile in Babylon, points towards the coming of the Messiah. Daniel Shutte, a member of the St. Louis Jesuits in the USA, wrote our next hymn in 1981. This hymn uses imagery from the call of Isaiah and has become one of our most popular hymns. Hymn number 663, 'I, the Lord of sea and sky,'

Prayers of Intercession

Grant them wellbeing, hope and peace not only through the professional care and support they are given, but by feeling your presence during their time of need. In your mercy, hear our prayer for people who are lonely, depressed, or anxious, for those who are experiencing problems with addictions, or with relationships and for those who have been bereaved. Help us to be sensitive to the needs of people around us, so we can befriend and support them. In a period of silence, we pray for everyone know who need your help at this time.

Loving Lord, hold them in the warmth of your love, so they experience comfort, hope and peace.

Sovereign Lord, we pray for the victims of war and man's inhumanity to man. We pray for peace in the many lands where fighting mars the lives of ordinary people, especially Ukraine and the Holy Land, and in countries like Iran where people face brutal repression. Remember those affected by terrorism, oppression and discrimination. Guide the leaders of the world to seek justice and mercy in their dealings and to resist the temptation to use force in order to impose their will on others. Reading: Matthew 4: 12-23 (NIV)

When Jesus heard that John had been put in prison, he withdrew to Galilee. Leaving Nazareth, he went and lived in Capernaum, which was by the lake in the area of Zebulun and Naphtali—to fulfill what was said through the prophet Isaiah:

“Land of Zebulun and land of Naphtali,
the Way of the Sea, beyond the Jordan,
Galilee of the Gentiles—
the people living in darkness
have seen a great light;
on those living in the land of the shadow of death
a light has dawned.”

From that time on Jesus began to preach, “Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near.”

As Jesus was walking beside the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon called Peter and his brother Andrew. They were casting a net into the lake, for they were fishermen. “Come, follow me,” Jesus said, “and I will send you out to fish for people.” At once they left their nets and followed him.

Going on from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John. They were in a boat with their father Zebedee, preparing their nets. Jesus called them, and immediately they left the boat and their father and followed him.

Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and healing every disease and sickness among the people.

Our next hymn is a modified and, I hope, improved version of one I originally wrote on New Year’s Day 2017, after I had been to worship at Amblecote Wordsley, during which the words sprang to mind. It is sung to “Mount Sion”, used for Charles Wesley’s hymn, ‘Give me the faith which can remove’. We shall sing, ‘The Lord invites us, “Come and see,”’

Hymn – The Lord invites us, ‘Come and see’

- 1) The Lord invites us, ‘Come and see,
Now leave your work and follow me:
Spend time with me and you shall see
I’ve come to save humanity.’
Christ Jesus calls, so let us go
And talk with him, our hearts aglow.
- 2) The Lord invites us, ‘Eat with me;
The Bread I share will set souls free.
I bring good news for everyone
Bowed down by sin and woe-begone.’
Christ Jesus calls us; ‘Share my Bread,
I have a gospel you must spread’.
- 3) The Lord invites us, ‘Hear my word,
Reflect, then spread what you have heard.
Go to this world of greed and pain,
And seek to make it whole again.’
Christ Jesus calls us; Don’t delay!
Let loving-kindness win the day.
- 4) The Lord invites us, ‘Follow, friends,
I bring good news that never ends.
Come, be my hands, my eyes, my voice;
Use all your talents and rejoice.’
Christ Jesus speaks; let’s heed his call:
And share good news with one and all.

Sermon: “Come, follow me,” Jesus said, “and I will make you fishers of people.”

It is clear that the arrest of John the Baptist galvanised Jesus' mission, for he moved to Capernaum and called the twelve as he began his public ministry. He may have chosen the region of Galilee because it was relatively free from government interference, or perhaps because it was radical in its views towards both Herod and the occupying Romans, so the people might be less inclined to make trouble for him when they heard his preaching. His choice of Galilee also fulfilled the prophesies of Isaiah: **“In the past the Lord humbled the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the future he will honour Galilee of the Gentiles, by the way of the sea, along the Jordan—The people walking in darkness have seen a great light;”** Jesus first brought the light of God's Good News to a district where there was a complex mixture of Jews and Gentiles, showing that God the Father's new covenant with human beings was to be for all people who would accept it, not only Jews.

What is the significance of Matthew's account of the call of Andrew, Simon Peter, James and John? To begin with, Jesus called ordinary people engaged in mundane tasks. The first four disciples were fishermen who would have required the following qualities: courage to brave the sudden squalls on the Sea of Galilee; patience to wait for the right conditions to cast their nets; teamwork to fulfil their duties and confidence that God would provide the fish to catch. These qualities suited them to the calling of the Lord. Nevertheless, other people would have struggled to see anything special about these men, so Matthew was teaching that Christ can do extraordinary things with simple people like us. Jesus did not need to call in consultants, experts or spin-doctors, for his message is simple and needs no spin: **“Turn from your old way of life, follow my path and be a member of God's kingdom.”**

Both Matthew's and Mark's accounts of the calling of the first four disciples say that they answered the call at once, which is almost certainly not meant literally, for they had both business and family responsibilities, so they would have needed to make provision for both before they left home. After all, what kind of people would they have been if they'd simply walked out of business and home? Matthew and Mark used the immediacy of responding to Christ's call to encourage readers to act quickly, before others could dissuade them, or their enthusiasm waned; after all, the longer we wait before we begin a challenging task, the more likely it is that we'll be filled with doubts and will give up. I am grateful for Sister Jane Day who literally prodded me to answer my call to preach after a decade of backsliding. Ira Sankey was given no choice.

The American evangelist, Dwight Moody was only modestly successful in his hometown, Chicago, even though he was a very gifted preacher. However, in 1870, thirty-year-old Ira Sankey travelled to an international YMCA convention at Indianapolis, for a rally led by Dwight Moody. Despite Dwight Moody's inspired preaching, the rally was clearly failing to inspire the congregation, for the music was abysmal. The organist played too slowly and the singing lacked conviction. Sankey waited until there was a pause, then rose and sang William Cowper's, **“There is a fountain filled with blood”**, unaccompanied. There was an awed silence during the first verse; then everyone stood to sing the remaining verses with gusto. Thereafter a new spirit flowed through Mr. Moody's rally.

At the end of the meeting, Dwight Moody sought out Ira Sankey and immediately enquired, **“Where are you from? Are you married? What is your business?”** Ira Sankey replied he was from Newcastle, Pennsylvania, was married with two children and was a government tax inspector. Impulsively, Mr. Moody retorted, **“You will have to give it up!”** adding, **“I have been looking for you for eight years.”** Thus began a twenty-six-year evangelical partnership that brought thousands to know and serve the Lord.

Just as Jesus called, **“Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is near,”** so we need to strike while the iron is hot, rather than finding excuses not to act. A Christian poster once asked, **“If you were arrested for being a Christian, would there be enough evidence to convict you?”** May all of us be able to answer “yes” to that and may our words and deeds provide clear evidence as we answer our call to follow Christ Jesus. **Amen.**

We close our worship with a hymn by Revd. Herman G. Stuempfle, Jr., one of the most prolific and theologically thoughtful hymn writers in the United States at the turn of the Twenty-first Century. He was Professor of Preaching at the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Gettysburg until his retirement in 1989. It was an active retirement, as he continued to teach, preach, lead workshops and conferences, and write hymns, many of which challenge us. Hymn number 674, 'Would I have answered when you called'

StF 674 – Would I have answered when you called

- 1) Would I have answered when you called,
'Come follow, follow me!'?
Would I at once have left behind
both work and family?
Or would the old, familiar round
have held me by its claim
and kept the spark within my heart
from bursting into flame?
- 2) Would I have followed where you led
through ancient Galilee,
on roads unknown, by ways untried,
beyond security?
Or would I soon have hurried back
where home and comfort drew,
where truth you taught would not disturb
the ordered world I knew?
- 3) Would I have matched my step with yours
when crowds cried, 'Crucify!',
when on a rocky hill I saw a cross
against the sky?
Or would I too have slipped away
and left you there alone,
a dying king with crown of thorns
upon a terrible throne?
- 4) O Christ, I cannot search my heart
through all its tangled ways,
nor can I with a certain mind

you'll give me strength beyond my own
to follow faithfully.
