Prayer of Adoration and Confession

Reading: Genesis 2:15-17 & 3:1-7

The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it. And the Lord God commanded the man, 'You are free to eat from any tree in the garden; but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat from it you will certainly die.'

Now the snake was more crafty than any of the wild animals the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, 'Did God really say, "You must not eat from any tree in the garden"?' 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Reading: Matthew 4: 1-11

Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. After fasting for forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. The tempter came to him and said, 'If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread.' Jesus answered, 'It is written: "Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God."'

Then the devil took him to the holy city and set him on the highest point of the temple. 'If you are the Son of God,' he said, 'throw yourself down. For it is written: "He will command his angels concerning you, and they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone."' Jesus answered him, 'It is also written: "Do not put the Lord your God to the test."'

Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendour. 'All this I will give you,' he said, 'if you will bow down and worship me.' Jesus said to him, 'Away from me, Satan! For it is written: "Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only."' Then the devil left him, and angels came and attended him.

Sermon

"Then Jesus answered, 'Go away, Satan! The scripture says: Worship the Lord your God and serve only him!" Matt. 4. 10

According to Matthew this is Jesus' second visit to a wilderness. The first was when he went out to be baptised by John. Now Wilderness might mean 'a deserted place', but it can also represent the place where poor and outcaste people lived; or even an 'experience' of feeling lost, of needing someone's help to find direction and sustenance. It is a place for thinking things through – of working out how to go about things. If the story of Jesus' baptism shows us his commitment to his Father's call, the temptation story shows us Jesus sorting out his priorities for putting that call to ministry into practice.

First of all, he had to realise that his message was much bigger than bread. The idea of Jesus winning popularity by offering bread to his people is rather like a modern political party in opposition promising tax cuts. Popularity can be much more appealing than truth, or facing up to tough issues. No doubt many people in Israel at that time were hungry and needed bread, but if Jesus had taken on the role of provider, his bigger message would not have been heard and it is likely that bread would have been only a start. Other demands would have followed. Pleas for bread would have escalated to other demands, just as today demands for better working conditions leads on to a demand for higher wages, even when, for many, it seems that their wages are already reasonable.

Yes, bread is necessary. But Jesus taught us to pray: Give us this day our daily bread. And he was deeply moved by human need. Indeed, his message of love has a raw political edge. We can only love most of our neighbours – that is, ensure that they have bread – through the kind of society we want for them. But Jesus must put God, first because God the creator is love, the source of all loving and the source of good neighbourly relationships. The love of God is the source of human interdependence and inter-relationships; it expresses the hope that all people will be treated justly, and have enough food and drink. So food cannot be Jesus' first concern. Man does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God... words such as You shall love the Lord your God. That is the beginning of all good things. It is not bread but Jesus, the message of God for the world, who is the bread of life.

The next point to note from the temptations is that we must act responsibly. The second temptation is that Jesus should behave as though he were a puppet and God were a puppeteer. No doubt Jesus would have drawn a big crowd if he had jumped off the Temple, and been caught by an angel before he hit the ground. But it is not in the nature of God to rescue people who behave with deliberate foolishness. God must not be put to the test as though whatever human irresponsibility may lead to, God will somehow pull off a miraculous rescue. Human freedom and responsibility have their consequences.

Whether one accepts that global warming is actually taking place because of the effect of greenhouse gases, or not, there are some facts that cannot be avoided. Deserts are increasing in Africa, India and, most alarmingly, in China. So great are the demands on the environment in China that some rivers are drying up, and the effects of pollution are so severe that in many of the industrial areas there is an epidemic of chest complaints and asthma. In India, bore holes are having to be drilled ever deeper as the water table goes down. There are more serious forest fires in various parts of the world than used to be the case. The flooding of about a quarter of the land mass of Bangladesh is now, more or less, an annual event. If we continue to destroy our environment, if we continue to over-use the earth's resources, if the competition for water from the Himalayas leads to war between China and India (as some observers predict could be the case), or if by 2050 life for many people can no longer be sustained, will God step in and rescue humanity? I think not. Human irresponsibility has its consequences. God is not a puppeteer who will step in to halt the inevitable. Jesus knew that trying to test God was not an option. His teaching, love God and love your neighbour as yourself, was not a pious adaptation of the commandments of the Old Testament; it points the way of responsible, stable and caring citizenship.

The final point I want to make this morning is that there can be no short cuts. The third temptation was to find a way of achieving quick results. There are all kinds of devilish ways that religious people try out to gain influence over others and thence claim a large following. The history of Christianity is littered with the relics of those who have found it more convenient to cut corners, to capitulate to the ways of the world, than to practise the integrity of love. In our own day, some evangelists (and especially in America, it has to be said) have made spurious claims about their power to heal so long as people pay up handsomely enough. Other evangelists have claimed their message was so urgent that unless people responded immediately and unthinkingly, they would be in danger of the fires of hell (were there such a thing!) Yet others have used techniques of emotional blackmail, or techniques that led to hysteria and fear. But neither must we think that these things couldn't happen in this country. They could. Given the decline in church attendance in Britain, the temptation to use short cuts to popularity is real enough. But that is not the way of love. The call to accept and serve our neighbours as brothers or sisters, to seek only good for those around us in our world – even those who have been portrayed as enemies – to feed the hungry, clothe those living in poverty and house the homeless, requires prolonged, honest, creative and loving effort. We might have to stand up to those in authority, as Jesus had to. It might mean that as Jesus suffered for his faith in love, we too might have to suffer for our faith in love.

Worshipping God and serving God does not involve withdrawing from the world, it means putting first the call and ways of God, and working lovingly as God's co-workers in the creation of his kingdom of love, justice and peace. Whatever happened long ago in the wilderness at the beginning of Jesus' ministry, Matthew tells a story that is not simply about Jesus. It is a story about every generation of his followers, including us. We too must work out our priorities. We too, with Jesus as our companion, must learn how to put God, and the ways of God, first.
