#### Reading: James 5:13-20

This passage is a set of questions that goes like this:

Voice 1: Are any among you suffering?

Voice 2: They should pray.

Voice 1: Are any cheerful?

Voice 2: They should sing songs of praise.

Voice 1: Are any among you sick?

Voice 2: They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord.

Voice 1: The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven.

Voice 2: Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective.

Voice 1: Elijah was a human being like us, and he prayed fervently that it might not rain, and for three years and six months it did not rain on the earth.

Voice 2: Then he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain and the earth yielded its harvest.

Voice 2: My brothers and sisters, if anyone among you wanders from the truth and is brought back by another...

Voice 1: ...know that whoever brings back a sinner from wandering will save the sinner's soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins.

In preparing to hear our challenging Gospel reading we imagine the testimony of the disciple John...

'We thought we were doing the right thing, telling Jesus that we saw someone casting out demons in his name. We thought he'd be a bit annoyed and have words with him because he wasn't one of us. But what happened? It was me that got it wrong, that's what. Jesus let me know in no uncertain terms that people doing things in his name shouldn't be turned away. I don't think it was the first time he had said something like that to us, either. But I was a bit confused when he started going on about stumbling blocks. More than that, I thought he'd lost the plot. Yes, I get it (now!) that I shouldn't get in the way of those who want to do the things they saw Jesus do, even if they are not part of our group. But, surely it's going a bit far to suggest putting a millstone round my neck and jumping in the sea? Or cutting off bits of my body — it's more than a bit extreme! Just how important is this kingdom living? I got the bit about the salt, I think. Something that looks like salt but isn't salty is no good to anyone. Anyway, see what you think...'

## Reading: Mark 9:38-50

John said to him, "Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because he was not following us." But Jesus said, "Do not stop him; for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterward to speak evil of me. Whoever is not against us is for us. For truly I tell you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward. "If any of you put a stumbling block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea. If your hand causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire. And if your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life lame than to have two feet and to be thrown into hell., And if your eye causes you to stumble, tear it out; it is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into hell, where their worm never dies, and the fire is never quenched. "For everyone will be salted with fire. Salt is good; but if salt has lost its saltiness, how can you season it? Have salt in yourselves, and be at peace with one another."

#### Reflection

In the period just before Covid-19 hit at the beginning of 2020, if someone had suggested that we were about to enter a world of 'social distancing', 'lockdown', 'furlough' and 'self-isolation', we probably would have thought it was the plot of a new dystopian novel or TV drama.

The disciples hearing Jesus say the words we heard in this week's Gospel reading may have had the equivalent first-century reaction. Better to throw yourself in the sea or cut off your limbs...what was Jesus talking about? Surely this cannot be real?

Just as, in hindsight, those pandemic words and phrases – and the rules and way of life associated with them – now make sense, Jesus' very graphic language begins to make sense as we look at the example of kingdom living given in the passage from James' letter. Here we see people being encouraged to pray with those who suffer, sing with those who are cheerful, and anoint those who are sick.

Jesus is speaking passionately in Mark's account about making sure we don't get in the way of good deeds being done, of Kingdom values being lived out. James backs this up by saying - live as Jesus lived –share and care, treat and value everyone equally, and all the time trusting and having faith in God.

Jesus' graphic imagery emphasises the importance of these kingdom values, which are so important that life without them is not really life at all – or not life as God intends it to be. Life is where the things that are not part of kingdom living are eliminated – greed, self-centredness, exclusion, bullying and many other things that hurt, belittle or damage people.

Is this possible for us today? James refers to the story of Elijah. Elijah prayed for something that seemed impossible – specifically for the rain to stop and then start again; you can read the full story in 1 Kings 17. It may seem impossible to us that, given the way the world and society is now, God's kingdom will come to fruition anytime soon. The task is surely overwhelming. Elijah thought the same. But that didn't stop him or put him off.

And we should not be put off. Let's pray for the impossible. Let's look for God at work in what we are doing, of course, but also in what others are doing – especially those of whom we might be tempted to say 'They are not with us.' Let us be open to hearing Jesus' words speak into our experience: 'Whoever is not against us is with us.' Let us encourage and welcome everyone and anyone who is living and promoting God's kingdom values – or, if you prefer, way of living.

God is present in every good deed – so let us encourage each other to be the best people we can be – and never to be a stumbling block to one of God's beloved children.

### Response – Reflection

Take time to think about what 'seeing God in ourselves and others' means.

- Where do you see God?
- Reflect back on the last few days can you see where God was present through unexpected people / words or situations?
