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#### **Prayers**

For our opening prayers I will be referring to the Palm Cross – If you have one within reach please hold on to it and follow the unifying actions within our prayers

Hold the cross vertically to think of the branches waved by the crowd

We think of the crowds waving their branches to welcome Jesus. We praise God for Jesus our King, for his presence in our lives, to walk our journey with us, to protect and care for us, to love and comfort us and to be a guiding light in all we do. Praise for Jesus our King.

### Hold the cross on the palm of your hands

We think of Jesus carrying the cross. We praise God for Jesus, the bearer of our sins, for the faith we hold in his name. We Praise God that Jesus listens, guides, forgives and does not judge. We praise God for Jesus the healer, in mental and physical struggles, the strength he gives to us, in facing the difficult journeys and situations we are bound for. He knows our journey, our suffering and our sins. We think of the indignity in carrying his own cross, the suffering and weariness in his approach to Calvary yet with his only focus – that of salvation for us all.

Hold the cross by its horizontal bar and think of Jesus nailed to the cross

We think of Jesus nailed to the cross, a difficult picture to visualise. We praise God for Jesus who died for us, Our Saviour, who sacrificed himself for us, a slow painful death that would give way to salvation. Even on the cross Jesus prayed for forgiveness for those left behind. We turn to God and pray for those who

may be out of our reach, that they shall know his love like us. For those not yet of faith or belief and to help us spread the word of God through Jesus' sacrifice

Finally, hold the cross vertically again, and see it is empty

We think of an empty Cross. The Saviour has risen. We praise God that Lord Jesus came back to us, that he stayed with us and continues to live by our side. WepPraise God that Jesus is here and watching, comforting and blessing us each and every day with life, with love, with passion, with purpose and with contentment. We praise God for a saviour sent to hold us all and keep us in faith.

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# Reading: Luke 19:28-39 Jesus comes to Jerusalem as king

After Jesus had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. As he approached Bethphage and Bethany at the hill called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples, saying to them, 'Go to the village ahead of you, and as you enter it, you will find a colt tied there, which no one has ever ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, "Why are you untying it?" say, "The Lord needs it." Those who were sent ahead went and found it just as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, 'Why are you untying the colt?' They replied, 'The Lord needs it.'

They brought it to Jesus, threw their cloaks on the colt and put Jesus on it. As he went along, people spread their cloaks on the road. When he came near the place where the road goes down the Mount of Olives, the whole crowd of disciples began joyfully to praise God in loud voices for all the miracles they had seen:

'Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!'

'Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!'

Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to Jesus, 'Teacher, rebuke your disciples!'

#### Meditation

Hello, I thought, what's going on here? And you can hardly blame me, for there I was, minding my own business, when suddenly these fellows I've never clapped eyes on appeared from nowhere and, cool as you like, started to make off with our donkey! In broad daylight, too, that's what I couldn't get over — bold as brass, without so much as a by-your-leave! Well, you can imagine my surprise, can't you? Hardly the kind of goings-on you expect in a quiet village like ours. So I asked them straight, 'What's your game?' And that's when they spoke those special words 'The Lord needs it'

Not the fullest explanation, admittedly, but it was all I needed, for straight away it all came flooding back – that day when Jesus came by and for a few wonderful moments I met him face to face. No, you won't have heard about it, for it wasn't the sort of encounter to hit the headlines – no stunning healing or unforgettable miracle needed in my case, but he touched my life as surely and as wonderfully as any, offering a new direction, a fresh start from which I have never looked back. Quite simply, he changed my life, and though I'm not the sort to shout it from the rooftops I wanted to respond nonetheless, to show Jesus how much he meant to me, how much I valued what he'd done.

This was it, the chance I'd been waiting for, my opportunity to give something back at last. Hardly earth shattering stuff, I grant you – the loan of a donkey, but that didn't matter; the fact that Jesus had need of me – it was all I needed to know. He arrived soon after, and I followed him to Jerusalem, where the crowds were waiting to greet him, wild with excitement, shouting their praises, throwing down their cloaks in welcome – and small though it had been, I knew I'd done my bit to make that great day possible. Never forget that, whoever you are, however little you think you have to offer, for some day, some time, your moment will come – a day when your contribution to his kingdom will be requested in those lovely words 'The Lord needs it'

## Reflection

The events of that day, Palm Sunday, are well known to us. We know all about the donkey, the palm branches, perhaps in the past we have waved branches in church or at the very least we have held palm crosses aloft. We have sung the hymns and shouted Hosanna, or Hallelujah at the appropriate times no doubt sometimes we have been moved by it all, sometimes perhaps we have felt jaded by it's familiarity. For us, with the benefit of hindsight, perhaps there is a tinge of sadness that this great day of rejoicing is so quickly followed by the baying of the mob for crucifixion. But what did it mean to the people there, to the followers of Jesus, this Rabbi from Nazareth, to the crowds, to the religious authorities, to the Romans? All four Gospels have accounts of the arrival of Jesus into Jerusalem riding a donkey or colt or both, they all place the event somewhere around the beginning of the Passover festival. In Luke's version, rather than palm branches, cloaks are spread in the road. The tradition of celebrating a new king by throwing your clothes on the path before him went back to the days of Elisha. It first appears in 2 Kings 9.13, where people spread their cloaks under Jehu when Yahweh anointed him as the King of Israel. Jehu want on to liberate Israel from the heirs of Ahab and Jezebel, he destroyed all traces of that regime and the worship of Baal associated with it, there was violence and bloodshed. Was this in the minds of the people the day they put their cloaks under the hooves of the donkey? Were they expecting Jesus to liberate them from the regime of the Romans with violence and bloodshed?

Every part of the day, every action was full of meaning and significance. The words they sang 'Blessings on the king who comes in the name of the Lord' is taken from Psalm 118 and Jesus was fulfilling the prophecies of Zechariah. It was all written in the scroll of Zechariah. How the Messiah would storm Jerusalem. Zechariah 9.9 proclaims:

Rejoice greatly, Daughter Zion. Sing aloud, Daughter Jerusalem. Look, your king will come to you. He is righteous and victorious. He is humble and riding on an ass, on a colt, the offspring of a donkey. Jesus was doing his part to fulfill the prophecy by riding into town on a donkey colt.

Not only that, but Jesus' parade route had begun at the Mount of Olives. Again, just like Zechariah said it would happen: On that day he will stand upon the Mount of Olives, to the east of Jerusalem (Zech. 14.4). The disciples led the singing and rejoicing because of what they had seen Jesus do, they had seen his generous actions, his healing, his miracles, they had heard his teachings, they had lived and travelled with him for nigh on three years. They were confident that everything had led to this day, this day of triumph. So they shouted and sang 'Blessings on the king who comes in the name of the Lord!'

Some of the Pharisees asked Jesus to check his disciples, why? Was it that they didn't agree, that they were miserable people just trying to spoil the atmosphere? Jerusalem was part of a land under a foreign rule and as Jesus and his disciples were coming in from the Mount of Olives through the eastern gate of the city, the Roman governor Pilate would have been riding into Jerusalem from the western gate, with a battalion or two of Roman forces with him. Every year, hundreds of thousands of worshippers came into Jerusalem for the Passover, from every corner of the known world. It was the festival that every faithful Jew had to attend. It was difficult to ensure safety and security in such conditions so the Romans were their in force.

Passover had and has huge significance for the Jewish people. Passover was the Jewish holiday that celebrated the time their God had liberated them from another empire—Egypt. A time when their God had defeated the ruler of Egypt who had enslaved them, now they were under the rule of Rome could it happen again? The Jews believed it and the Passover brought all the simmering resentments and hopes to the surface, it would only take a spark for a riot or rebellion to begin. The Pharisees and other religious leaders would be held accountable by the Romans for any trouble, so they asked Jesus to control his followers.

To keep the occupants in their place Pilate rode in with pomp and ceremony riding a war horse, there would have been chariots and weapons on display. Look at the contrast, Jesus as so often turns things upside down, there is no war horse for this king but a donkey, a farm animal, this is what a king who comes

in peace looks like, his followers are on foot, they come from the lowest stratas of society, they are the rowdy peasants, the ordinary everyday folk people like us.

Pilate rode into Jerusalem with a show of force to remind people that Ceasar was in charge, his tactics were to use violence and intimidation. Jesus rode into Jerusalem with humility on a donkey, his tactics are to show love, to show generosity in love and forgiveness, to give us a choice. God has been generous to us - John 3 (16) proves it when it says 'God loved the world so much that he gave his only son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life.' The owner of the donkey repaid Jesus in a simple way by loaning his animal, we too can serve Jesus can show our love and gratitude in simple ways, by loving others by spreading his kingdom values in how we live, how we react to the world and circumstances around us. Amen

## **Prayers of Intercession**

Lord Jesus Christ, you entered Jerusalem in quiet humility, taking the form of a servant, even to the point of death on a cross, emptying yourself so that we might be filled.

Come afresh to our troubled world with all it's needs, its tensions, we think especially of America, its problems, here we think of the pandemic, and we think of all the worlds evils, of injustice and inequalities, of misused power and of oppression.

Come afresh, bring healing where there is division, love where there is hatred, hope in place of despair, joy in place of sorrow, strength where there is weakness, healing where there is sickness, life where there is death.

Lord Jesus Christ reach out to your world so that your will may be done on earth even as it is in heaven.

Come again now and establish your kingdom, for in your name we pray. Amen
