Christ's coming into the world evokes a whole range of human reactions. May we together pray that this Advent will encourage us to reflect on our own response to Christ through the lens of these rich events.

Reading: Luke 1:5–23

In the days of King Herod of Judea, there was a priest named Zechariah, who belonged to the priestly order of Abijah. His wife was a descendant of Aaron, and her name was Elizabeth. Both of them were righteous before God, living blamelessly according to all the commandments and regulations of the Lord. But they had no children, because Elizabeth was barren, and both were getting on in years.

Once when he was serving as priest before God and his section was on duty, he was chosen by lot, according to the custom of the priesthood, to enter the sanctuary of the Lord and offer incense. Now at the time of the incense offering, the whole assembly of the people was praying outside. Then there appeared to him an angel of the Lord, standing at the right side of the altar of incense. When Zechariah saw him, he was terrified; and fear overwhelmed him. But the angel said to him, "Do not be afraid, Zechariah, for your prayer has been heard. Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you will name him John. You will have joy and gladness, and many will rejoice at his birth, for he will be great in the sight of the Lord. He must never drink wine or strong drink; even before his birth he will be filled with the Holy Spirit. He will turn many of the people of Israel to the Lord." Zechariah said to the angel, "How will I know that this is so? For I am an old man, and my wife is getting on in years." The angel replied, "I am Gabriel. I stand in the presence of God, and I have been sent to speak to you and to bring you this good news. But now, because you did not believe my words, which will be fulfilled in their time, you will become mute, unable to speak, until the day these things occur."

Meanwhile the people were waiting for Zechariah, and wondered at his delay in the sanctuary. When he did come out, he could not speak to them, and they realized that he had seen a vision in the sanctuary. He kept motioning to them and remained unable to speak. When his time of service was ended, he went to his home.

I didn't believe it was possible, not any longer, not after all those years of trying. There had been so many disappointments, so many false alarms, and we'd given up, ages ago. It still hurt occasionally, of course it did. We love children, both of us; and we'd have given anything to see that little crib occupied, that lovingly embroidered shawl wrapped around our little baby. We shouldn't have tempted fate - it was stupid, we know that now - but at the time we never anticipated any problems, and we just couldn't help looking forward, planning for the future: two bright-eyed young things with so much before us, or so we thought.

She used to cry, Elizabeth, after her hopes had been raised only to be dashed again. And although I'd try manfully to comfort her, assure her next time it would be different, all the while my heart was breaking as much as hers. But then she started to torture herself, feeling she'd failed me somehow, that it was all her fault, even God's punishment for some unrepented sin. I don't need to tell you she was wrong, but it was hard work making her see that - so much extra heartache before she finally accepted it was just one of those things.

But then I had this dream - at least I think that's what it was. I was in the temple and suddenly a man appeared telling me we were to have a child, ordained by God and consecrated to his service, so he said. Well, I dismissed it, of course; a cruel trick of the mind, that's what I thought, but the next thing I knew, there was Elizabeth, a look of wonder in her eyes, blurting out the news that she was expecting! Well, you could have knocked me down, you really could! I honestly thought she was having me on, that the strain had finally got to her. But I couldn't tell her - I'd been struck dumb since that dream of mine. So I just stood there, trying to humour her. I'm glad now I couldn't speak, pour scorn on the idea, for she was right.

A child, at our time of life! I still marvel every day I see him, our wonderful little boy. And I know now never to lose hope for with God nothing is impossible. But there's an odd twist I have to mention, for though our baby brought us joy, more than words can ever express, somehow Elizabeth seemed even more excited by the birth of her cousin's boy -Jesus the name was - always claimed he was more of a miracle than John, though I can't think why. She's no nearer understanding this crazy world of ours than I, but when she looks at Jesus sometimes I get, this strange feeling it's in him, rather than John, that she's looking for an answer; he she hopes will one day make sense of it all.

Reading: Luke 1:57-66

Now the time came for Elizabeth to give birth, and she bore a son. Her neighbours and relatives heard that the Lord had shown his great mercy to her, and they rejoiced with her. On the eighth day they came to circumcise the child, and they were going to name him Zechariah after his father. But his mother said, 'No; he is to be called John.' They said to her, 'None of your relatives has this name.' Then they began motioning to his father to find out what name he wanted to give him. He asked for a writing tablet and wrote, 'His name is John.' And all of them were amazed. Immediately his mouth was opened and his tongue freed, and he began to speak, praising God. Fear came over all their neighbours, and all these things were talked about throughout the entire hill country of Judea. All who heard them pondered them and said, 'What then will this child become?' For, indeed, the hand of the Lord was with him.

Reading: Exodus 3:1-14

Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up." When the Lord saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." Then he said, "Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." He said further, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.

Then the Lord said, "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. So come, I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt." But Moses said to God, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?" He said, "I will be with you; and this shall be the sign for you that it is I who sent you: when you have brought the people out of Egypt, you shall worship God on this mountain."

But Moses said to God, "If I come to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your ancestors has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" God said to Moses, "I Am Who I Am." He said further, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'I Am has sent me to you.' "

Reflection- Zechariah Doubted

The Elizabeth/Zechariah story is often missed as one of God's key preparatory events to the birth of Christ. They are a faithful couple – 'righteous before God' – but older and without children. One day Zechariah receives the privilege of entering the sanctuary of the Lord and an Angel appears and tells him that he and his wife will bear a son who will bring many to the Lord and prepare people to receive the Lord. And in the face of this amazing moment – Zechariah doubts... He trots out questions and uncertainties... 'how will this happen, how will I know, we are just too old!'

Let's be clear, doubt is OK, it can be a healthy response that tests and question the integrity of a situation. Doubt is common even amongst our own faith communities but it is not something we should fear, supress or dismiss in ourselves or those we meet. The great servant Moses expressed doubt of God on many occasions – in particular at the burning bush, standing on Holy Ground, in the face of a calling from almighty God he looks for more and seeks further assurances.

Revd Moir in his sermon on doubt comments: What I have come to value is a faith that is so rooted in the deep, deep love of God that it has no fear of asking difficult questions or rethinking attitudes or even of discovering wisdom in other traditions. Doubt is fine and a healthy part of an open trusting relationship with God who is big enough to listen to our awkward questions, hear our doubt, bring comfort and will not disappear because of it.

Sadly some Christians seek to tackle doubt by trying to tie down exactly what the Christian faith is. We see many organisations that have their own very carefully defined statement of faith designed to differentiate themselves from another group who believe something almost exactly the same but different enough that boundary lines must be drawn. This is the language and process of fundamentalism. This narrowness of mind misses the point. God is beyond our understanding and definitions, there are many ways to read scripture and experience shows that doubt is not dispelled by statements of faith but by faith in action. As James 3:13 reminds us: *Who is wise and understanding among you? Let them show it by their good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom.*

So whilst doubt can be a good and healthy test I also sometimes wonder why God made Zechariah dumb for a while? Perhaps God sought to stop Zechariah spreading his doubt. As we know rumours and doubt can also be dangerous things. They can grow out of proportion and lead to terrible outcomes. For example in our current context those who deny Covid and doubt the importance of being vaccinated put themselves and those they love at huge risk. Whilst honest doubt is fine, aggressive doubt can be insidious, it damages trust, breaks relationships and divides communities. Zechariah asked God 'how will I know that this will be so?' The word he uses is the same Greek word used in John 1:10 *He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him.'* Its meaning is rooted in how will I 'realise/recognise/learn/understand' and so KNOW with confidence that what I am being told will happen? The meaning of this word bridges both the head and the heart.

The key for me is the Angel's response in v19 "*I am Gabriel. I stand in the presence of God, and I have been sent to speak to you...*" which is itself a recasting of God's classic Old Testament response to Moses' doubt in Exodus 3:14 – "*I am who I am*". We perhaps see that God's response to doubt is not restatement of the case, nor is it continued argument and the further presentation of facts or reasoning – God makes doubt powerfully and directly a matter of faith.

It's not uncommon that when people meet Jesus they doubt; 'who is this man, how is he relevant to me and my life?' Whilst we should always be prepared to take time to argue, define and explore the nature of salvation – perhaps we can also learn from how God responded to Zechariah and to Moses, with a more deep rooted statement about faith and the nature of God. As we enter Advent – a time of waiting for the coming of God in Christ – just like Zechariah, we carry with us our own doubts and uncertainties. And God say – that's OK. BUT much more than that, God says 'I am who I am' – eternal, magnificent, gracious, just and loving. I pray that we/you, may experience and know the presence of the living God in your daily life and so be able to set your doubts aside and be assured by grace through faith, that God is with us today and always. Amen
