But as for you, man of God, shun all this; pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance, gentleness. Fight the good fight of the faith; take hold of the eternal life, to which you were called and for which you made the good confession in the presence of many witnesses.

Reading: Luke 16: 19-31

"There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table; even the dogs would come and lick his sores. The poor man died and was carried away by the angels to be with Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried. In Hades, where he was being tormented, he looked up and saw Abraham far away with Lazarus by his side. He called out, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue; for I am in agony in these flames.' But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that during your lifetime you received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner evil things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in agony. Besides all this, between you and us a great chasm has been fixed, so that

those who might want to pass from here to you cannot do so, and no one can cross from there to us.' He said, 'Then, father, I beg you to send him to my father's house—for I have five brothers—that he may warn them, so that they will not also come into this place of torment.' Abraham replied, 'They have Moses and the prophets; they should listen to them.' He said, 'No, father Abraham; but if someone goes to them from the dead, they will repent.' He said to him, 'If they do not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be convinced even if someone rises from the dead.'

Sermon

The story/parable Jesus told, which we have just read, can lead us to thinking about many subjects including the nature of heaven and hell. Today it is not my intention to address such a subject. Like many of the parables of Jesus it is really about Kingdom living. At a simpler level it makes us think about how we treat our neighbour and value people in society.

During Covid times we started to value the people who did the everyday jobs we took for granted, like shop assistants and health and social care workers. But now with less focus upon the virus, though the virus still lingers, have attitudes to staff in such jobs reverted to what it was? Treating people with respect is sadly not the way of the world. All around we see notices saying that "we expect our employees to be treated with respect, and no abuse will be tolerated." Recently I was accused of being "too nice" in how I treated other people and my expectation of honesty. Should I change my way of treating others, to conform to the way of the world or continue to seek to challenge the way others live?

In Birmingham, the Methodist Church is at the heart of a project called <u>Street Banquet</u> - their website is https://www.streetbanquet.org.uk/ - challenging attitudes of value for the marginalised in our society. Street Banquet is rooted in another Jesus parable, the Parable of the Great Feast as recorded in Luke 14: 15-24. (Go on, if you are at home reading this, open your bible and find it.) Here is a vision of a table where the most marginalised and disempowered people are invited and welcomed as honoured guests. The parable challenges social norms, breaks down barriers and turns conventional roles upside-down. Street Banquet is a place where hosts become guests and guests become hosts — a sign of the New World of God.

Earthly wealth and heavenly riches

A 2024 Oxfam report on global economic inequality found that, between 2020 and 2024, roughly five billion people had become poorer, while the fortunes of the world's five richest individuals had doubled. This 'yawning gap' is also evident in our Gospel reading, which contrasts the fortunes of an unnamed rich man who dresses in fine array and dines sumptuously every day while ignoring the poor, starving Lazarus, who lies at his gate. The gap between rich and poor has always been present but can we find a way to narrow it?

A number of years ago, Michael Gove said he wanted all schools to be above average – impossibility. Likewise, not all can be above average income. The difference in society between poor and rich is the big problem, the proximity of wealth and poverty. The problem is in many cases how the rich became so. On 10th September, Larry Ellison, the 81-year-old founder of the technology giant Oracle, overtook Musk as the richest man in the world – a title Elon Musk has held for almost a year – when shares in Oracle rose by 40%, valuing Ellison's fortune at \$393bn, just ahead of Musk's \$384bn. To earn this title, Ellison did... nothing.

There are dozens of countries around the world with a lower GDP than the wealth of one person. 24 years ago, I was trekking in China for a hospice in the community where I was living. One night, we were staying in a hotel in Chengde. We were in a very comfortable hotel — a little different to the one we had stayed in a couple of days earlier. A short distance from the hotel we walked through areas of poverty; there was a vehicle, like an old VW Campervan, concreted onto the ground and this was a family home. People often misquote the bible on this subject "the love of money is the root of (all) evil" as this was how it was translated in the KJV. A more accurate translation is For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil, and in their eagerness to be rich some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pains.

Wealth is not in itself a bad thing – what matters is what we do with it. Paul wrote to Timothy, As for those who in the present age are rich, command them not to be haughty, or to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on God who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life.

To be Content

Paul wrote about being Content in all situations.

I rejoice in the Lord greatly that now at last you have revived your concern for me; indeed, you were concerned for me, but had no opportunity to show it. Not that I am referring to being in need; for I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well-fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me.

(Philippians 4: 10-13)

Contentment is not something our world strives for. In the western world, we live in a consumerist society, where we always want the next thing and can't rest until we have it. We live in a throwaway society where many think of their own convenience rather than the impact on a wider world. One of the things Anita and I have noticed in our recent look at houses is that new houses have very little storage space whilst around us we are encouraged to buy, buy, and buy, but where do we put it?

Can we truly be content whilst seeing others suffering?

In what areas in your life are you content/satisfied? The Epistle reading today asks us to look to God for our contentment. God's generous nature gives us all we need. Our happiness is in all that God has generously provided, rather than the ever-changing gimmicks the world offers. We perhaps need to change our mind-set to that which Paul encouraged Timothy to have and to share.

Of course, there is great gain in godliness combined with contentment; for we brought nothing into the world, so that we can take nothing out of it; but if we have food and clothing, we will be content with these. (1 Timothy 6: 6-8)

As the writer of this week's Thought for the Week in the Roots material put it:

We didn't bring any money into the world with us, and we can't take it out with us – that is not where our wealth lies. Rather, our wealth lies in the knowledge that by grace we are saved. We can't do anything to

make God love us more and nothing we do can make God love us less. This knowledge brings us freedom, peace, joy and contentment. This knowledge helps us to spend our monetary wealth in ways that please God, and helps us to share the skills and abilities we have in a generous way. This is true wealth.

As your people let us be people of open doors and hearts and not closed and locked gates, in the name of our Saviour Jesus. **Amen.**
