Jesus Feeds the Five Thousand

¹³ When Jesus heard what had happened, he withdrew by boat privately to a solitary place. Hearing of this, the crowds followed him on foot from the towns. ¹⁴ When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them and healed their sick.

¹⁵ As evening approached, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a remote place, and it's already getting late. Send the crowds away, so they can go to the villages and buy themselves some food."

¹⁶ Jesus replied, "They do not need to go away. You give them something to eat."

¹⁷ "We have here only five loaves of bread and two fish," they answered.

¹⁸ "Bring them here to me," he said. ¹⁹ And he directed the people to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. Then he gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the people. ²⁰ They all ate and were satisfied, and the disciples picked up twelve basketfuls of broken pieces that were left over. ²¹ The number of those who ate was about five thousand men, besides women and children.

Reflection

One of the first things that happened when Covid 19 struck was fear, fear of the unknown, fear of lockdown, fear of not being able to go out, fear of running out of the essentials. This fear could be seen in the initial queues outside of supermarkets and shops. At first the queue outside Sainsburys (other supermarkets are available) in Wolverhampton snaked around three sides of the large underground car park, there was a real fear of food and other essentials being scarce, which led to panic buying, which in turn led to shortages.

Our reading this morning contains two meals, one of plenty and one made from scarcity. The story comes immediately after the account of the beheading of John the Baptist.

John had been imprisoned by Herod Antipas, he had dared to question the relationship between Herod and Herodias, his sister in law.

Herod was at a feast celebrating his birthday, as part of the entertainment, Salome, daughter of Herodias, danced for the King. He was so thrilled with this that he made a rash promise to give her anything she wanted, the result, to Herods' dismay, was the beheading of John and his head on a platter. The first verses of John 14 suggest that Herod was haunted by these events, in his guilt he sees Jesus as John returned.

When Jesus hears what has happened to John, he tries to find a quiet place, perhaps to mourn, but the people hear where he is and follow him. He puts aside his feelings and has compassion on them.

There are two meals in this chapter, the birthday party and the feeding of the crowds. In the first story there is a tale of plenty, of food, of misery, of revenge and scheming. In the second tale, by contrast is a story of need, of compassion and of provision. The feeding of the crowds is motivated by compassion, the beheading of John is fuelled by vindictiveness.

Perhaps there is a parallel to be drawn here between the Kingdom of Herod and the Kingdom of God.

Jesus on seeing the crowds has compassion for them and this attitude rubs off on his disciples who come to him, concerned that it is growing late, asking him to send the crowds away to get food for themselves.

But look at the response of Jesus, he says that the disciples are to give them something to eat. How often do we ask God to do or resolve a situation only to find that we become the answer to our own prayer? To find that we are asked to do something about the situation.

The disciples gather together their meagre resources of five loaves and two fish and give them to Jesus. See what happens! He takes the loaves and fish gives thanks, breaks the bread and gives to the disciples who then distribute to the crowds who are well fed and there are leftovers. God is always generous

Some see this meal as a forerunner of the Eucharistic meal, the Holy Communion. The people are seated in an orderly fashion, the bread is prayed over, broken and distributed, everyday things are used and made special, bread and fish.

From the meagre provisions the disciples can muster Jesus feeds 5,000 + and there are leftovers. Jesus asks us to give him our meagre resources, either as a Church or individually and to see what happens. See what miracles Jesus can perform with our meagre resources

Perhaps we don't feel we have much to offer but Jesus can take whatever that is and do wonders and miracles with it.

Perhaps looking at the numbers this morning we feel as a church we have little left to offer, perhaps as individuals we feel tired, weary, disheartened but I say to you gather your resources and give them to Jesus and see what can happen, wonders and miracles will ensue!
