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Reading: Micah 3: 5 - 11

My people are deceived by prophets who promise peace to those who pay them, but threaten war for those who don't. To these prophets the Lord says, "Prophets, your day is almost over; the sun is going down on you. Because you mislead my people, you will have no more prophetic visions, and you will not be able to predict anything." Those who predict the future will be disgraced by their failure. They will be humiliated because God does not answer them.

But as for me, the Lord fills me with his Spirit and power, and gives me a sense of justice and the courage to tell the people of Israel what their sins are. Listen to me, you rulers of Israel, you that hate justice and turn right into wrong. You are building God's city, Jerusalem, on a foundation of murder and injustice. The city's rulers govern for bribes, the priests interpret the Law for pay, the prophets give their revelations for money – and they all claim that the Lord is with them. "No harm will come to us," they say. "The Lord is with us."

Reading: 1 Thessalonians 2: 9-12

Surely you remember, our brothers and sisters, how we worked and toiled! We worked day and night so that we would not be any trouble to you as we preached the Good News from God.

You are our witnesses, and so is God, that our conduct towards you who believe was pre, right, and without fault. You know that we treated each of you just as a father treats his own children. We encouraged you, we comforted you, and we kept urging you to live the kind of life that pleases God, who calls you to share in his own kingdom and glory.

StF 713 – Show me how to stand for justice

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Reading: Matthew 23: 1-12

Then Jesus spoke to the crowds and to his disciples. "The teachers of the Law and the Pharisees are the authorized interpreters of Moses' Law. So you must obey and follow everything they tell you to do; do not, however, imitate their actions, because they don't practice what they preach. They tie onto people's backs loads that are heavy and hard to carry, yet they aren't willing to lift a finger to help them carry those loads. They do everything so that people will see them. Look at the straps with scripture verses on them which they wear on their foreheads and arms, and notice how large they are! Notice also how long are the tassels on their cloaks!

They love the best places at feasts and the reserved seats in the synagogues; they love to be greeted with respect in the market places and to be called 'Teacher'. You must not be called 'Teacher', because you are all members of one family and have only one Teacher. And you must not call anyone here on earth 'Father', because you have only the one Father in heaven. Nor should you be called 'Leader', because your one and only leader is the Messiah. The greatest one among you must be your servant. Whoever makes himself great will be humbled, and whoever humbles himself will be made great.

Sermon

"We encouraged you, we comforted you, and we kept urging you to live the kind of life that pleases God, who calls you to share in his own kingdom and glory." (1 Thess. 2: 12)

Who speaks for God? Through the centuries, the voices of those who claim to speak for God have been issuing conflicting messages. And today the confusion is no less marked. Suicide bombers claim the authority of God for what they do, whether it be in the name of Allah, or otherwise. The religious right in America is no less sure that it is on the side of God. In conflicts far and wide factions claim divine sanction for terrible atrocities, and the result is that many are turned off religion altogether because they can no longer stomach the arrogance of those who know that they are right, and use their certainty as a stick with which to beat others.

The Bible readings today address this burning problem. Sometimes it is quite difficult to see the relationship between the readings in the Lectionary, but there is no mistaking the connection today. The prophet Micah was scathing in his condemnation of those prophets who tempered their message to suit the audience. He described them as promising prosperity for those who offered them food, but, on the other hand, denouncing and reviling those who gave them nothing to eat. The prophets were often employed by the ruling authorities to declare the word of the Lord, and Micah saw how easy it was for that employment to corrupt those who were in it for the money. After all, it is dead easy to tell your boss precisely what he wants to hear!

So, who speaks for God? That was obviously a big issue for the early churches, too. It appears that the whole of the second letter to the Thessalonians was written to discredit the claims of preachers who were causing alarm within the community and within the church. The early Christians had a strong sense that they were living in the last days before God's judgement would be revealed. The end of the world, they thought, was near, and in that atmosphere unscrupulous preachers could exploit the peoples' expectations and play on their fears.

So the reading from First Thessalonians, which we heard today, reminded the Christians that those who had founded the Church there had always stressed that what really mattered was faithful living. They were to live lives worthy of the God who had called them to share in the life of the kingdom. There is the implied suggestion that one way of testing the authenticity of God's messengers was in the quality of the lives lived by those who responded to them in faith. And as a way of underlining the integrity of the message, those who had founded the Church in Thessalonica sought no reward for their ministry. They worked for a living so as not to be a burden on the Church. They were not in it for themselves, but only for God's glory and for the sake of those who came to believe through them.

We know other instances in the New Testament that there were still false prophets around. And the reading from Matthew's Gospel in which Jesus warned his disciples about trouble ahead – wars and rumours of wars, punishment and even execution, betrayal and hatred – alerted them to the rise of false prophets. "*Many men, claiming to speak for me, will come and say, 'I am the Messiah!' and they will deceive many people.*" And in the words of Psalm 43, we all want to be "*delivered from lying and evil people*".

It has always been an issue, both for those who are called to be messengers of God, and those who hear the message. How can we be sure that the message is genuine?

Those of us who are preachers know how often we are constrained by those to whom we minister. It is always possible to compromise the gospel for fear of upsetting particular people, and churches have been known to put undue pressure on those to whom they regard as 'in their employ'. The problem that Micah addressed is still with us. Those who speak the word of God can fall into the trap of saying what they believe people want to hear. Micah believed that words of warning were required, rather than promises of prosperity and comfort. In the very next chapter of his book, the true prophet offers a vision of peace that is God's will for all peoples, and he calls them to a life of justice, faith and humble walking with God. But before he could get to that positive assertion of God's word, he knew that he had to confront the false prophets and the leaders who were abusing their power. And he did so fearlessly, knowing that there were no rewards for harsh words.

One of Bob Dylan's songs satirises those who claim that God is on their side and that they know what God wants them to do. It is a temptation to try to validate your actions by claiming that you are carrying out the Lord's will. Indeed, Holy Wars have been fought on the assumption that we know we are right and that God has told us what to do. But the Bible readings today warn us that it is not easy to hear, or to speak, the word of God. The message has often been distorted, and the messengers have often been misguided, if not deliberately perverse.

Our text today from 2 Thess. 2: 12, puts it clearly: "We encouraged you, we comforted you, we kept urging you to live the kind of life that pleases God, who calls you to share in his own kingdom and glory."
