Reading: John 14:1-14

'Do not let your hearts be troubled. You believe in God; believe also in me. My Father's house has many rooms; if that were not so, would I have told you that I am going there to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am. You know the way to the place where I am going.'

Sermon - 'God had not forgotten Noah.' Genesis 8: 1

Phew! What a relief! God had not forgotten Noah. The different translations tackle this verse in Genesis in varied ways, all carrying subtle meanings. God took thought for, and God did not forget. Perhaps, though, that of the Good News Bible packs the real punch. God had not forgotten Noah. Although a link phrase put in by the story-teller, it was the message Noah needed to hear. To appreciate its full force, the story of Noah and the flood is best read at a sitting.

In today's reading, we only got the second half. We need to hear it as a whole, just as those who first heard it, told with all the dramatic tension of good story telling. Then we would begin to feel what Noah must have felt as the first rains came. The Arc floated and drifted as though crossing an endless ocean, twisting this way and that as eddies and whirlpools caught it. Days and weeks passing with no landfall in sight. No help at hand. Each counted new moon must have brought increased anxiety. None had ever been to sea before. Would they ever escape from this extra-ordinary journey into the unknown? They knew the ground beneath them when they floated off, but what was underneath them now? Maybe they shared the common human thought – God alone knows – followed quickly by the guilt-inducing question: Has God forgotten us?

How often this sense of remembering comes into our relationship with God, not least when things are dire! And surely there can't be many situations more dire than that of the two men who hung alongside Jesus on the Cross. Even though human bestiality seems to come up with new horrors in each generation, the Roman punishment of crucifixion takes a lot of beating. Intended to inflict unbearable pain, with the humiliation of being made a public spectacle, lifted high so that all could see, there were few more excruciating ways to die. But as that moment drew near, one of the men asked Jesus to remember him when that glorious day came and his kingdom was established. We don't know whether he was thinking in terms of some special favour. Perhaps he was echoing the prayer of the tax collector who came face to face with the Pharisees in the temple: God, have pity on me, a sinner. Maybe, he was simply offering his own prayer in extremis: Lord, in your mercy, remember me. That's a prayer that may resonate with many of us.

Being forgotten can be a devastating experience. The car was packed for the picnic, everyone piled in, full of excitement. It was not until they had gone some distance that someone realised that one of the children had been left behind.

They raced back to discover that the child had taken herself to bed with her comforter. For some years afterwards, whenever the family was going anywhere, she would plead, Mummy, please don't forget me.

To be forgotten is to have one's spirit crushed a little. In comparison to so many things it's very natural to feel insignificant, but that really comes home, and can leave us deeply hurt, diminished, when we are forgotten. Being remembered is so very important. Perhaps, though, there is an experience that is even more crushing. Jesus himself endured this when he was on the cross. For him, it felt that God had deliberately turned his face away, and forsaken him in the hour of his greatest need. No wonder he cried out. We need to understand the force of this to grasp something very important. God had not forgotten Jesus. The New Testament proclamation is not that Jesus rose from the dead. It is that God raised him from the dead. The resurrection itself is word in action, affirming that God had not forgotten. God does not forget.

Don't we really need to grasp the truth of this? Don't we really need to grasp it firmly simply because life is precisely what it is? Time and again situations arise in our own lives, to say nothing of happenings in the lives of those we know about, that bring the questions bubbling up from the depths within us. Even if humility makes us hesitate to call them our moments of dereliction, they emerge with disturbing power. We may not scream aloud the question – Where is God? – but oft-times we come close to it. Questions lodge in the mind and unsettle us. Doesn't God care? Has God gone off without us?

These questions are not new. Humanity has not changed much down the ages. Long ago, the people of Israel wrestled with just such issues. One possible solution was that God goes to sleep on the job. That would at least explain their continuing troubles. But no; not so, said the Psalmist: God neither slumbers nor sleeps. Part of our trouble is that our DNA does not carry all this from parent to child. Each generation, indeed each individual has to work these issues through for themselves. We cannot generically pass on a data bank of assured wisdom, or an inherent stimulus to an assured faith, in the same way that we can pass on familial characteristics or, sadly, various infirmities.

What we can pass on is the testimony of those who have tackled the issues before. So we receive the experience of those who have gone before us and, in particular, the witness of the scriptures. Both our Bible readings today in some way or other touch on this theme. Noah discovered that God had not forgotten him, and Jesus prepares his disciples for the time when, inescapably, they will feel they have lost him forever, indeed may even feel that, in choosing the way of the cross, he had thrown away everything that he had gained and abandoned them. Only later, would they discover just how wrong they were.

Jesus seemed to know exactly what they would be thinking, how the same old questions would hit them with fresh force. So, he offered them experience in advance of the event! What better way to affirm that he would not abandon them, nor forget them for one moment? They will feel utterly bereft but he is on a task on their behalf. I go to prepare a place for you. They will feel they have lost him for ever. Truth to tell, he says, I will come back and take you to myself, so that where I am you may be also. He wanted them to experience the renewing power of the resurrection.

Of course, the penny didn't drop. So much so that when the experience became a reality, it astonished them. Praise be, then, that their surprise is part of the story that we have inherited. Praise be that their astonishment is part of what our ever-caring God has provided for us – even before we need it – to comfort us in our troubles. God had not forgotten Noah. And he will not forget you!
