Reading: John 10: 11-16 & 27-30 (NIV)

'I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep. So when he sees the wolf coming, he abandons the sheep and runs away. Then the wolf attacks the flock and scatters it. The man runs away because he is a hired hand and cares nothing for the sheep.

'I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me – just as the Father knows me and I know the Father – and I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that are not of this sheepfold. I must bring them also. They too will listen to my voice, and there shall be one flock and one shepherd.

My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one will snatch them out of my hand. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all[a]; no one can snatch them out of my Father's hand. I and the Father are one.'

Reflection

Jesus often spoke in rural images that communicated visually to the people he addressed. Although we are not familiar with those images today, they can still say a lot to us; even in our modern, urban, industrialised world.

One such image that Jesus used was that of a shepherd. This was a common image that people in his day saw. Canaan was largely a pastoral region more than an agricultural one, and shepherds were very commonplace. When Jesus says 'Good Shepherd', he is referring to more than merely the skill that the shepherd has — that of being a good shepherd. He was referring to it more in the way that we would refer to a good doctor or a good teacher. The image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd is one of the loveliest we have of him, and we owe it to Jesus himself because this is how he described himself and his mission.

Jesus is no hireling. The hireling doesn't own the sheep and runs away as soon as he sees the wolf approaching. Jesus is the Good Shepherd; the sheep belong to him and he is ready to die for them.

He made wonderful promises to those who belong to him. Firstly he promised that none of them would ever be lost. No-one would succeed in snatching the sheep from his care – the sheep that the Father has entrusted to him. The sheep that belong to him will be safe with him. Secondly he promised to lead them to the pastures of eternal life.

The feeling of belonging to Jesus and being known and loved by him is a very comforting and reassuring one. He will take care of us in life and in death. He said 'I give them eternal life... they will never be lost'. But the relationship has to be a two-way thing; we have to choose to belong. So, how can we tell that we truly belong to his flock? What does belonging entail? Well, essentially three things:

- The first and basic requirement is, obviously, to believe in him. We enter the flock by becoming believers, but belief is only the beginning.
- 2. The second requirement is to listen to him. 'My sheep listen to my voice' is what Jesus says. To listen to his voice and to heed his teachings.
- 3. And the third requirement is to follow him. 'My sheep follow me' and to follow him is to do his word.

Eastern shepherds raise their sheep for wool rather than for meat, so sheep were with their shepherds for many years and were often known by descriptive names like – say – brown leg or black ear. The shepherds knew each of their sheep – every one of them – and the sheep knew their shepherd's voice. The shepherd knows the uniqueness of each one of his sheep.

Two shepherds had sheltered their flocks in a cave during the night. The next morning, they were faced with the problem of sorting them out. One of the shepherds stood some distance away and gave a peculiar call which his sheep recognised, and soon his whole flock had run to him leaving behind the other shepherd with his sheep. Have you ever been to a function where you didn't know a soul there? Where you felt so alone? So isolated? So distant? Then, all of a sudden, someone from across the room calls your name. You are recognised! You are not alone! You relax because you belong!

The Good Shepherd knows each of his sheep by name. The Indian theologian D T Niles once noticed a young Indian shepherd boy keeping a huge flock of sheep. He stopped and asked, 'How many sheep do you have?'

'I don't know' the boy answered 'I can't count.'

Niles asked him 'How do you know if some of the sheep have wandered off when you get to the place where you are going to camp for the night?'

To his astonishment the boy answered, 'I don't know how many wander off but I know each one by name. I can't count, but each sheep has a name and I know each of their names.'

Shepherds led their animals. They didn't drive them, and they stayed with their flocks day and night protecting them with their rod – a short club type of instrument – and retrieving them from dangerous

situations with their staff – a long pole with a crook in the end that could go round the animal's body and drag it to safety. That is why bishops carry a crook to this day as a sign that they are shepherds of the flock.

God watches and protects his flock. We are his flock! When we cry out, he comes to us. When we look for him, he is there to assist. And when we are in danger, he rescues us. The great thing is that when we stray from him, he seeks us out and calls us back to him. He constantly strives to nourish us and bring us back to the safety of his fold. It is easy to get lost in our world; to run around doing things that must be done, and I must say that I feel very much like that at the moment! There seems to be so much to do and so little time to do it, and it's easy to lose track of where we are and where we should be. It's so easy to be so busy that we get tired out and we find ourselves hungering for a bit of peace, but we don't know where to find it. Maybe it's at times like this that we should just pause – stop and look at where we are and trust in God to see us through. To bring us to the green pastures and still waters that will refresh us, but, as we all know, that is easier said than done!

Maybe our church this morning can be a place of refreshment and relaxation for us. God has led us here today and here is food for our journey – refreshment for the week ahead – whatever it might hold. Sometimes we are made to feel that the whole world is our responsibility. That we must care for the world, be concerned about the environment. That we must be involved in caring for the refugees, and strive to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, and bring justice to the poor. We are told what we can do for the world but not what God can do for us. There are many obstacles and dangers in our lives. There are many drains on our energy and many things that challenge us. Alone, we can be overwhelmed by them, but the good news is that we are not alone. There is One who watches over us and gives us the strength and protection that we need.

An old Chinese proverb tells the story of a fox that was captured by a tiger. The fox said 'You can't eat me because the gods have made me leader of all the animals.' The tiger did not believe him but the fox said 'Follow me and see if any animal challenges me.' The tiger agreed to this and followed directly behind the fox as the fox began his walk through the forest. To the tiger's amazement, it turned out to be exactly as the fox had said, not a single animal they encountered challenged the fox. Indeed, every animal they met fled in sheer panic. After several such encounters the tiger finally agreed that the fox was the leader of all the animals and let him go.

So, what does this proverb teach us? It teaches us that it is easy to remove the obstacles that oppose us when we have a tiger behind us.

Psalm 23 tells us that it is God walking with us that overcomes everything that is overwhelming. It is the Good Shepherd who brings comfort to the flock. If the work we do is wearing us down, then we need to turn to God for help. We need to turn to the Good Shepherd.

Are we weak and heavy-laden, cumbered with a load of care?
Precious Saviour, still our refuge — take it to the Lord in prayer!

Reflection

It's not only sheep and coins that get lost – people get lost too. It is said that about 250,000 people disappear in Britain every year, from children to the elderly, for every sort of reason, leaving behind incredulous families who live in a mixture of hope and despair, unable to accept what has happened or to grieve as they would over a death. A <u>National Missing Persons Line</u> was set up in Britain in 1992 and is open 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year. It is one of the fastest growing charities in Britain.

Why do they go missing? Some run away from unhappy homes. Some are abducted by a separated parent. Some are victims of violent crime. Most countries have no accurate record of the number of children that go missing each year. Most police forces don't act upon a report that a child is missing for at least 24 hours. Many countries have sophisticated programmes for tracking down stolen cars and credit cards but not for missing children.

People can get lost in so many ways. People addicted to alcohol or drugs. People who can't hold down a job or finish a course of studies. People who are unable to maintain a stable relationship. All of these can be said to be lost, and it is extremely difficult to find them. What makes it so frustrating is that they are not usually far away. They are lost in our midst – lost, even within the bosom of the family. Yet, no-one seems to be able to reach them. In these cases, the task of the shepherd is not so much to find them as to help them find themselves.

Jesus shows his concern for the 'lost sheep'. A shepherd doesn't wait for the lost sheep to come back. He goes looking for it. As it is with Jesus. He is the messenger sent to us by the Father. He didn't wait for sinners to come looking for him. He went out of his way to look for them, and when he found them, he escorted them back to the Father's house with joy. To repent is to come back to God – and to come back to God is to come home.
