Our Epistle is Romans chapter 10 verses 5 to 15

Moses describes in this way the righteousness that is by the law:

"The person who does these things will live by them."

But the righteousness that is by faith says:

"Do not say in your heart, 'Who will ascend into heaven?' " (that is, to bring Christ down) "or 'Who will descend into the deep?' " (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). But what does it say? "The word is near you; it is in your mouth and in your heart," that is, the word of faith we are proclaiming: That if you confess with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.

For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you confess and are saved. As the Scripture says, "Anyone who trusts in him will never be put to shame."

For there is no difference between Jew and Gentile—the same Lord is Lord of all and richly blesses all who call on him, for, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved." How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can they preach unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" Amen.

The Gospel reading is Matthew chapter 14 verses 22 to 33

Immediately Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead of him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowd. After he had dismissed them, he went up on a mountainside by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but the boat was already a considerable distance from land, buffeted by the waves because the wind was against it. During the fourth watch of the night Jesus went out to them, walking on the lake.

When the disciples saw him walking on the lake, they were terrified. "It's a ghost," they said, and cried out in fear. But Jesus immediately said to them: "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid."

"Lord, if it's you," Peter replied, "tell me to come to you on the water." "Come," he said. Then Peter got down out of the boat, walked on the water and came towards Jesus. But when he saw the wind, he was afraid and, beginning to sink, cried out,

"Lord, save me!" Immediately Jesus reached out his hand and caught him. "You of little faith," he said, "why did you doubt?"

And when they climbed into the boat, the wind died down. Then those who were in the boat worshipped him, saying,

"Truly you are the Son of God." Amen.

I wrote our next hymn specifically for the last reading, as there was nothing about Peter attempting to walk on water. I suppose, if you think about it, who would want to write a hymn on such a subject? However, as I sat and mused, the melody 'Calon lan' filled my head and the words were written down with two hours! We shall sing the hymn, 'Save me, ever-gracious Saviour,'

1. Save me, ever-gracious Jesus,

As I face life's surging sea: Where you've trodden I would follow, But self-doubt is sinking me! *Chorus:* Build my faith to keep me standing As I tread life's surging sea. Lord, the wind and waves commanding, Take my hand – deliver me!

2. Lord, I love you and would follow, But at times my fears prevail: Bid me come – then I shall trust you, For with you I cannot fail. *Chorus:*

3. In my weakness grant me courage Help me share Good News with all; Help me love through life's disasters – Grant me strength to serve your call. *Chorus:*

4. Hold me, ever-gracious Saviour, So, whatever life may bring, I shall love and serve my neighbour, Evermore your praises sing! *Chorus:*

Sermon: "Lord, if it's you," Peter replied, "tell me to come to you on the water." Mt 14:28 I know quite a number of Christians who find it difficult to accept any of Jesus' miracles and attempt to find rational explanations for them. However, if we dismiss miracles as mere legends, are we not in danger of denying Jesus' divinity? I have heard people say that Jesus' walking on water could be explained by his being seen from a storm-tossed boat when he was walking along the shore, or on a submerged sandbank. I believe this miracle must have happened as the gospel writer said, though Peter's failure may have been told in the pattern of Rabbinic teaching stories.

The walking on water and stilling of the storm follows the feeding of the five thousand and both have special significance. The feeding miracle may be compared with the manna God provided during the exodus and with Elisha feeding a hundred men with only twenty loaves. Thus, Jesus is shown to be even greater than Moses or Elisha, for he fed five thousand men and unnumbered women and children with minimal resources. The second miracle demonstrates his power over nature and fulfils Job's vision of the Omnipotent God: 'His wisdom is profound, his power is vast. Who has resisted him and come out unscathed? He moves mountains without their knowing it and overturns them in his anger. He shakes the earth from its place and makes its pillars tremble. He speaks to the sun and it does not shine; he seals off the light of the stars. He alone stretches out the heavens and treads on the waves of the sea.' I firmly believe that Jesus walked on water: he did not walk along the edge of the Sea of Galilee, nor on concealed sandbanks, for the account said the disciples' boat was a considerable distance from the land, as it was the fourth watch, sometime between three and six o' clock in the morning, probably six or seven hours after it had set out from Bethsaida. Indeed, John's gospel indicated the boat was approximately three and a half miles from shore, so the sandbank theory is highlyflawed.

John tells us that the miraculous feeding led many in the crowd want to make Jesus their king, which is not what he wanted, nor what he came to be. This may be why he had to order his disciples to sail away at once, whilst he went to pray alone: he would not have wanted them to be caught up in such worldly enthusiasm. By the time he was ready to join them, the boat was in the middle of the Sea, buffeted by a fierce headwind. Although several disciples were experienced fishermen, Jesus knew that everybody on board was afraid, for the sudden squalls on the Sea of Galilee were more than capable of overwhelming a small boat. Therefore, he made his way to them across the water, but his appearance probably as day began to break added to their terror, for human beings cannot walk on water, whereas spirits might. Jesus called out to them, "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid." It is worth noting that the Greek, 'ego eimi', literally means 'I am' - God's name for himself. In effect he implied that he is the Almighty One, who rules the wind and waves which threatened them. Peter's request to walk on the water may sound typically vain, but in fact, it shows a lack of faith, for he prefaced his request with, "Lord, if it's you," so he needed to experience a miracle to believe that the approaching figure was indeed, Christ. At first, Jesus granted his wish, but Peter's limited faith let him down when he felt the wind and saw the waves. He took his eyes off the Lord and sank into the sea, only to be rescued by Christ's saving hand.

And, as in the other accounts of the storm on the Sea of Galilee, Jesus quietened the wind and waves, demonstrating that he is truly God's Son.

This reading is relevant to Christians today, as a challenge to our faith. It is all too easy to find ourselves out of our depth in life: in church; at home; at work, or a combination of the three. We may then compound our problems by trying to rely on our own resources, rather than appealing to Christ for help. When we pray for help, we cannot expect God to click his fingers and put things right, but he will offer ways forward, if we are open-minded enough to recognize them. There is a story about a devout but misguided Christian in a flood. When the local river broke its banks, waters rushed round his cottage and he was trapped. Soon afterwards, a man rowed up to his front window and told him to climb out, so he could ferry him to safety.

"Thank you, but no," the man replied. "The Lord will save me!" So the man rowed away. An hour later, the water had reached his bedroom and as he stood looking out at the flood and praying, a motor launch roared up. Two lifeboatmen called out, "Open your window, climb aboard and we'll take you to safety."

"Thank you, but no," the man replied. "The Lord will save me!" So the launch left him and went to rescue other people. Two hours later, the man was sitting on his roof with water lapping round his feet. Again he prayed for God to save him. Soon afterwards a helicopter clattered its way to his cottage and hovered above, whilst a man descended on a winch line.

"Come on, mate," said the man, ""put this strap round you and we'll lift you to safety." "Thank you, but no," the man replied. "The Lord will save me!" So the helicopter rumbled its way across the flood, looking for others to save.

Soon afterwards, the cottager arrived at the gates of heaven where he saw the Lord.

"Almighty God," he grumbled, "I'm very disappointed. I kept praying for you to save me from the flood, but you didn't answer me, so here I am."

The Lord sighed: "My child, I don't understand. I sent a rowing boat, then a lifeboat and finally a helicopter. How could you possibly have drowned?"

In my role as a Chaplain I frequently find myself in situations where I feel I'm out of my depth, that I lack the resources to provide the support, comfort or help that residents or carers need. I know that God, who invested his Son's life to redeem fallen humanity, will never sell us short, so I always pray for help and guidance and he's never let me down, because there is always somebody, or something to draw me to safety. He'll do the same for you if you trust him and look for the help he'll provide. Amen.

We conclude our worship as we sing hymn number 661, 'Give me the faith which can remove'.

1. Give me the faith which can remove And sink the mountain to a plain; Give me the child-like praying love, Which longs to build thy house again; Thy love, let it my heart o'erpower, And all my simple soul devour.
