Call to Worship

As we come together to worship, this service will be on the theme of God's justice: Liberation, Provision and Presence. We worship a God of Justice and, as Methodists and as Christians, are called to live out God's justice in the world, through, as the Prophet Micah puts it Micah 6: 8

"He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God?"

The Methodist Church's Walking with Micah project is about that commitment: exploring what it means to be a justice-seeking church of justice seeking people.

God challenges Israel

Hear what the Lord says:

Rise, plead your case before the mountains, and let the hills hear your voice. Hear, you mountains, the case of the Lord, and you enduring foundations of the earth, for the Lord has a case against his people, and he will contend with Israel.

The Seventy Sent Out

After these things the Lord appointed seventy others also and sent them two by two before His face into every city and place where He Himself was about to go. Then He said to them, "The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few; therefore, pray the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest. Go your way; behold, I send you out as lambs among wolves. Carry neither money bag, knapsack, nor sandals; and greet no one along the road. But whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house.' And if a son of peace is there, your peace will rest on it; if not, it will return to you. And remain in the same house, eating and drinking such things as they give, for the labourer is worthy of his wages. Do not go from house to house. Whatever city you enter, and they receive you, eat such things as are set before you. And heal the sick there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' But whatever city you enter, and they do not receive you, go out into its streets and say, 'The very dust of your city which clings to [b]us we wipe off against you. Nevertheless, know this, that the kingdom of God has come near you.'

He who hears you hears Me, he who rejects you rejects Me, and he who rejects Me rejects Him who sent Me."

The Seventy Return with Joy

Then the seventy returned with joy, saying, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us in Your name."

And He said to them, "I saw Satan fall like lightning from heaven. Behold, I give you the authority to trample on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy, and nothing shall by any means hurt you. Nevertheless do not rejoice in this, that the spirits are subject to you, but rather rejoice because your names are written in heaven."

Sermon

This portion of Micah takes the form of a court case, God against his people. There was plenty of religious activity going on in Judah at this time, but it had become mere ritual with no reality. Micah's contemporary, Isaiah described the nation as sinful and sick from head to foot. Their worship no longer came from the heart, it had become nothing more than 'trampling' the courts of the Temple. As the people were in denial of this, Micah pictured God summoning them to a courtroom to hear the case against them and to prepare their defence. The mountains were called to take part because they had witnessed everything that had happened, including the covenant agreement being sealed and then broken by idol worship at the pagan altars and high places built on their hilltops.

God began by reminding the people that he had never burdened them, but had only ever shown them patience, care, love and grace. He bought them out of Egypt, gave them leaders to guide them through the wilderness years, and his laws to live by, turned an attempt to curse them into a blessing, protected them and brought them across the River Jordan into the promised land. Rather than remembering these events and their significance, the people had soon forgotten them.

Micah pictured the people wondering aloud what they should bring to God. After all this time the people still didn't seem to know what was pleasing to God. They thought that if they bought enough gifts and sacrifices to God He would accept them and forgive them. Their thinking had become so depraved and contaminated by the pagan nations around them they even believed that sacrificing their own children might work. Just as Amos had done in Israel, Micah reminded the people of Judah that God had already told them what he was looking for and it had nothing to do with rituals and sacrifices: "He has showed you, O man, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God"

There is a similarity in Luke's account of sending out the apostles and the story of Moses in Deuteronomy. Moses sent out twelve men to scout out the land just as Jesus has recently done when he sent out the

twelve disciples. Seventy elders accompanied Moses to the mountain top where the spirit rested on them and they prophesied, Jesus sends out the seventy to offer peace and to proclaim the nearness of the Kingdom of God.

In Deuteronomy the elect were those who obeyed the law, Deuteronomy promised blessings to the faithful, and Israelites interpreted blessings in a materialistic way- health and wealth. The people of Jesus day believed that health and wealth validated their right standing with God and that poverty and illness indicated God's displeasure.

The commissioning of the seventy broadens Jesus' missionaries beyond the twelve chosen apostles who have already been sent out. Now with the commissioning of the seventy the message of good news is the responsibility of all disciples not just the chosen few. The seventy are to go in pairs to neighbouring towns in an aggressive outreach - think Jehovah witness. The mission is to reach Gentile communities. The talk of harvest shows there is a hurry about sharing the good news and gathering in people to hear and believe. The seventy returned with great joy, through the power of Jesus even the demons are subject to them. The world turned upside down, a new Covenant with God, sin forgiven, new live given.

Today we are the apostles told to share the love of God to all nations not just to the lovable but to make a point of sharing with those who may not be respectable because of their differences. We are living in a time of increased anxiety and poverty, people in the UK relying on Foodbanks to survive even though many have more than one job. People are finding daily living harder as inflation hits us all, there are stories of carers having to leave their clients as they can no longer afford to put fuel in their cars to get to appointments. We are being told through the news that refugees are not welcome and as a country we must all do our best to condemn them, even if it means basic human rights are broken. The division in our society grows as we watch those with wealth find greater reward whilst those with little criminalised. We are the church should we raise our voices against immoral and illegal practices
